J. Elsesser called the meeting to order at 4:34 pm

Approval of Minutes T. Nuccio made a MOTION seconded by S. Powers to accept the minutes of the January 19, 2023 meeting as presented. MOTION passed unanimously.

Appointment of Auditor FY22/23

M. Walter made a MOTION seconded by T. Nuccio to appoint CliftonLarsenAllen as auditor for FY22/23. MOTION PASSED unanimously.

Town Reports

Columbia – M. Walter informed the board that the bank next to the town hall has been purchased. There is a possibility that a restaurant will be going in there.

Scotland – S. Powers reported that the town received a \$50,000 grant to improve the town hall.

Mansfield – R. Aylesworth informed the board that the new Elementary school has opened. They are still getting high copper in water samples throughout the building. They expect that to clear up by the fall. R. Aylesworth also reported that a raccoon was sighted at the town hall during daytime.

Tolland – T. Nuccio reported that a new farmers market will be opening on the Tolland Green. T. Nuccio also reported on a septic issue at a local café.

Coventry – J. Elsesser reported that Lakeview has signed a lease with 4 Dad's Pub. In addition the town has received a school air grant. The plan is to go out to bid by June. This will put air conditioning into the High School.

J. Elsesser reported that Congressman Courtney has directed congressional spending funds to the town for a water tower. 75% of the funding will be from the grant and 25% of funds will be from CT Water DSF funds. Hiring a well person to deal with well contamination issues. Things are still moving ahead with extending sewers in to Bolton.

Financial Report for the period ending 12/21/33

- R. Miller presented an overview of the report, highlighting the salient features. T. Nuccio made a MOTION, seconded by M. Walter to accept the financial report as presented. MOTION PASSED unanimously.
- B. Foley joined the meeting at 4:51pm.

Directors Report

R. Miller provided an update on the order issued for the establishment in Tolland with a septic problem.

Cosmetology Program Implementation

R. Miller reported on the implementation and progress of the program. Implementation generally going well and as planned. R. Miller recommends no changes to the sanitary code at this time.

Public Health Workforce Development and Infrastructure Grant

R. Miller reported that the Health District will receive \$229,000 this year. This will be worked into the next budget cycle. R. Miller is still waiting for guidance and contract terms from the state.

CDC Immunization and Vaccines for Children Supplemental Grant

R. Miller reported that this funding of \$185,000 will be used toward promoting and supporting vaccination programs. R. Miller is still waiting for spending guidance and contract terms from the state.

Quarterly Activity Reports for periods ending 12/31/22 and 3/31/23

- R. Miller presented a brief overview of the reports and offered to answer any questions.
- R. Miller noted that some COVID-19 activities are winding down at the state and federal level. EHHD will continue with vaccinations, education and infection control for the foreseeable future.
- R. Miller updated the board on the FDA Food Code implementation. He went over the background. He noted that local LHD and EHHD are scrambling to implement the new code. Staff training, orientation for businesses, new tracking software and new operational protocols are in development. R. Miller also noted that inspections have slowed due to the new form.
- R. Miller reported that the Itinerant Food Vendor MOU was executed in March 2023. IFVs can now travel to participating jurisdictions without additional permits and fees. This supports small businesses.
- R. Miller asked members to notify us if they have any ideas on where to set up opioid harm reduction risks at high volume town events.

CADH Bill Tracking Report

R. Miller called attention to 2(two) bills:

Bill HB5902 Local public health departments will be required to post to website restaurants that are in or out of compliance with food allergies training.

Bill HB6727 Lead bill – implementation of lower blood level standards. CADH will be investigating why the office of fiscal analysis indicated that no funding is being given to local health for this initiative.

Northeast District Department of Health Per Capita Increase - Implications

An increase in per capita fees at NDDH has lead to some of the towns in that district reaching out to other districts to join a new district. R. Miller outlined concerns with adding additional town(s) at this time. By consensus the board concurred with R. Miller's recommendation to not take on any new towns at this time.

Health District staffing update - job opening

R. Miller informed the board that Holly Hood will be retiring June 2^{nd} . Recruiting for her replacement is being done now.

Communication/Other

DPH re: Meet & Greet with new DPH Leadership Team

R. Miller informed the board that DPH will be scheduling a meeting with the district. At that time the board will be notified.

Background

As you may recall, the Health District applies for and receives annually federal block grant monies. For the past 14 years this grant has funded limited chronic disease prevention services to member towns, mostly in the form of policy & environmental changes to promote healthy behaviors. Unfortunately, for this funding cycle the CT DPH shifted the grant award to a state-wide competitive process.

The grant award, if our proposal is selected, is \$150,000 over five years. Within the proposal document attached will find the budget detailed on pages 23 to 35, and the proposed activity work plan detailed on pages 70 to 86. If our proposal is selected this award would fund predominately staff time for our current Public Health Project Specialist (Program Coordinator). the Community Health & Wellness Coordinator, and a Public Health Nurse. There are no agency matching funds required.

The executive summary can be found on pages 5 & 6. In brief, the proposal involves the establishment of a district-wide, self-monitoring blood pressure initiative, leveraging partnerships with schools, senior centers, fire departments, libraries, towns, and area healthcare providers.

A copy of the complete proposal is attached for your edification.

Recommendation

This funding would support agency activities intended to address high rates of elevated blood pressure among our at risk population. Authorization to submit the attached proposal, and then if awarded, authorization to execute the subsequent grant contract with the State of Connecticut is recommended.

If the board concurs then the following motion is respectfully recommended: Move, to authorize the Director of Health to (1) submit attached proposal for the Preventive Health Strategies at Work in CT Communities Grant as presented on June 15, 2023, and if awarded, (2) negotiate & execute the subsequent grant contract with the State of Connecticut.

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C. Executive Summary

As the regional public health authority for 10 member towns in Tolland and Windham Counties (Andover, Ashford, Bolton, Chaplin, Columbia, Coventry, Mansfield, Scotland, Tolland and Willington), the Eastern Highlands Health District (EHHD) is eligible to present a proposal for funding for this grant opportunity.

Furthermore, the EHHD is highly qualified to receive this award to partner with the DPH to implement Preventive Health Strategies at Work in CT Communities. For over 15 years the EHHD has demonstrated experience working collaboratively within the community to lessen the burden of chronic disease for the residents of member towns including the successful implementation of ACHIEVE, Community Transformation and Plan4Health grants; as well as a long history of compliance and successful outcomes with the annual DPH Preventative Health Block grants.

While there are many aspects of this RFP to address local Health District needs that could be justified for a proposal, the EHHD analyzed the data and opportunities at this time and zeroed in on the documented high rates of elevated blood pressure, diabetes and smoking for EHHD residents along with the higher-than-state death rates from heart disease and stroke in member towns. Accordingly this proposal focuses on the Healthy People 2030 objective to Increase the Control of High Blood Pressure. Often referred to as the "silent killer" because it may show no symptoms, high blood pressure increases the risk for heart disease, heart failure, and stroke. Evidence for narrowing the priority population for the proposed intervention to adults over the age of 50 was gathered from the 2021 Connecticut Healthy Aging Community Profile which magnified the risk factors for stroke and heart disease among older adults in EHHD member towns.

The EHHD community, especially those 50 and older, is at higher risk for coronary heart disease death and stroke than much of the state based on elevated rates of smoking among older adults, current high death rate from heart disease, documented high rates of high blood pressure, and significant rates of diabetes. All of these chronic disease indicators have common risk factors which can and will be addressed through the proposed intervention.

The proposed project the EHHD determined would create the greatest impact with the available funds is to facilitate and implement a self-monitoring blood pressure initiative utilizing evidence-based initiatives. Leveraging partnerships in the local community and implementing a three-tiered approach to Page 5 of 96

increasing access to automated blood pressure units that can be used at home and at work, the EHHD will impact over 1500 residents in the community. Commitments from a local primary care provider, Town administrators, libraries, fire departments, schools and senior centers expands the depth and breadth of resources across the EHHD, with each member town submitting one or more letters of support for their role in the proposed project.

The three components of this proposal are:

- A 1.5 hour educational program offered at venues that are accessible and acceptable to the
 priority population (senior center, library, fire stations, etc.). The curriculum will utilize
 evidence-based programs and will provide home monitors at no cost to participants.
- Library loan of an automated blood pressure monitor with instructions and educational materials, utilizing evidence-based programs.
- School self-monitor stations in the nurses' office with instructions and educational materials.

The EHHD envisions these three aspects of access to self-monitoring of blood pressure and engagement within the community to elevate awareness and access to resources leading to increased control of high blood pressure, a priority objective of Healthy People 2030. Promotion and referrals for each component of the Self-Monitoring Blood Pressure project will support the others. The EHHD will also engage local health care providers to be a referral point to maximize the reach and impact of this project.

The cost proposal for this initiative is for \$150,000 over the five year grant period. The EHHD has proven fiscal responsibility with grant resources and will make the most of on this opportunity by utilizing existing staff who have experience, knowledge, and trusted relationships in community at the organizational and community level to take the lead in implementing this project. The ability of the Health District to use experienced staff and long-term community partners will result in a swift implementation of strategies to maximize the impact of the time and funds available for the Preventive Health Strategies at Work in CT Communities grant.

D. Main Proposal

1. Organizational Profile

The Eastern Highlands Health District (EHHD) has a robust history of providing prevention, promotion and evidence-based interventions to reduce the impact of chronic disease in the member towns it serves. From being resourceful and fiscally responsible with the annual Preventative Health Block Grant funding to implementing national awards focused on sustainable change through policy and environmental changes such as those through the ACHIEVE, Community Transformation and the Plan4Health grants, the EHHD has been dedicated to achieving its mission and promoting public health throughout all member towns.

- **Mission**: Eastern Highlands Health District is committed to enhancing the quality of life in its communities through the prevention of illness, promotion of wellness and protection of our human environment.
- Vision: Healthy People, Healthy Communities, Healthier Future.
- Purpose: The Eastern Highlands Health District strives to put their motto of "preventing illness and promoting wellness" at the forefront of all services offered. The environmental health program provides the basic duties for which the Health District is best known, and their services are the backbone of efforts to "prevent illness" in our communities. Complementing this effort, the public health emergency preparedness program develops and secures the critical resources necessary to prepare for and respond to a public health emergency. Additionally, promoting wellness continues to be a guiding force as areas of need in the community are explored, and thoughtful, community-centric initiatives are implemented.
- As a quasi-governmental agency formed in June, 1997 the EHHD currently provides full-time health department services to ten member towns (Andover, Ashford, Bolton, Chaplin, Columbia, Coventry, Mansfield, Scotland, Tolland and Willington) and is governed by a Board of Directors.
- Current Range of Services:
 - Monitoring of health status to identify and solve community health problems including
 the regular review of public health data provided by local, state, federal, and nongovernmental agencies; completed 2014 community health needs assessment for
 Tolland County.

- O Investigation and diagnosis of health problems and health hazards in the community concerning health issues encompassing: Complaint investigation program, Laboratory services with emergency response services (5 to 15 incidents annually), Special Environmental Monitoring Projects, and responding to school and town public health concerns, providing consultation, and subject matter expertise.
- Informing, educating and empowering persons in the community concerning health issues through website resources and promotion (e.g. School initiatives '95210' & 'POW', tobacco-free initiatives, sun safety, tick borne diseases, asthma and rabies) response to public's need for timely information (EEE, WNV, COVID, Ebola, Zika, seasonal Influenza), localized responses through local partners such as schools, senior centers, town hall, and other local employers.
- o The EHHD is the leader and hub of the local public health system, with established relationships with multiple community partners and stakeholders for addressing issues ranging from chronic disease management (Community Health Action Response Team (CHART), Plan4Health initiative, Active Living Projects), participation on area workgroups including Substance Abuse Workgroup, Early Childhood town committees, Town Health and Safety committees, UConn Infection prevention committee and others.
- Enforcement of laws and regulations that protect health and ensure safety such as those related to Food Protection Regulations (licensing and temp event permitting), Subsurface septic system program (permitting, plan review and pit/perc tests).
- Connecting persons in the community to needed health care services such as the coordination and promotion of area flu clinics with VNA's, promotion of other community based health services when available (health screenings, dental clinics, wellness clinics, tick testing program, EHHD implemented flu clinics).
- Location of Office(s) or Facilities / Hours of Operation
 - Main office for the EHHD is located at 4 South Eagleville Road, Mansfield with other office hours provided for environmental services at several other town halls.
 - Office hours are Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday from 8:15am till 4:30 pm; Thursday from
 8:15am till 6:30pm and Fridays from 8am till 12:00 pm
- Relevant Experience: The EHHD has experience addressing health promotion topics including:

- Chronic Disease Prevention and Management: Extensive experience managing multiple-year grants (in addition to the annual Preventative Health Block Grant) to assess needs, facilitate policy and environmental change, and evaluate implementation of projects following best practices for addressing modifiable risk factors including Healthy Eating/Active Living resources and stroke and cardiovascular risk reduction. The EHHD has been invested in addressing the limited access to opportunities for physical activity in our rural towns in diverse ways to impact as many residents as possible. For example:
 - Lead agency for the collaborative efforts in Mansfield and Coventry to establish Safe
 Routes to School master plans resulting in significant funding for both towns to improve infrastructure around schools to facilitate active transportation for families;
 - Partnered with town senior centers to provide much needed exercise equipment;
 - Implemented Plan4Health initiative, a partnership between planning and public health bringing public health into land use decisions; winner of the CT APA Chapter 2016 Public Program Award;
 - Partnered with towns on multiple occasions to provide resources to increase
 opportunities in the local community for physical activity through Active Living Projects
 ranging from kayak and canoe loaner programs (free or very low cost) that have been
 actively supporting area residents for over 10 years, to trail enhancements and
 connections to increase options for active transportation and recreation; and
 - On-going partnerships to address physical activity in member towns include
 partnerships with parks and recreation directors, active participation on the UConn Bike
 Workgroup (assisting most recently in their attainment of Bike Friendly University), and
 the Bike Mansfield team (assisting most recently in the effort to implement the
 BikeWalk CT 4th grade education program at Mansfield Elementary School).

In addition to a focus on opportunities for physical activity, the EHHD has been the lead agency in other projects implemented across the Health District including:

- The successful self-monitored blood pressure program targeting older women;
- A multi-faceted employee wellness initiative focusing on policy and protocol that
 promotes wellness aspects with supportive programming to engage employees and help
 them focus on addressing modifiable risk factors for chronic disease; and

- The Produce of the Week campaign that partnered with schools and local grocers to increase consumption of fruits and vegetables.
- Tobacco Prevention: Facilitated tobacco-free policies in the Health District through partnerships with local towns including the advancement of "Tobacco-Free Campus" for the Town of Mansfield municipal buildings, worked with Town Parks and Recreation directors across the health district to designate parks and other outdoor spaces as "Tobacco-Free" and provided signage and policy language for implementation.

Chronic Disease Prevention and Management

As a large rural health district, the EHHD relies on partnerships in the community with schools, town departments and agencies and other non-profit organizations to move the EHHD vision into focus. The community knows and trusts the EHHD as a reliable health partner and is willing to explore innovative evidence- based programming and policy with the EHHD team.

For the past 15 years the EHHD has addressed social determinants of health, tobacco prevention and chronic disease prevention through policy, protocol and environmental changes to create a sustainable and broad impact across the ten member towns. Opportunities for targeted programming in collaboration with key partners to augment and support policy and environmental changes have proven to be effective in raising awareness and addressing modifiable risk behaviors for chronic disease.

It is significant to note that over the years of working on health promotion initiatives, the lessons learned, partnerships created and knowledge gained has been a springboard for subsequent initiatives, allowing the EHHD to start each new grant with community support and baseline resources to demonstrate successful outcomes. Training received during prior grants (ACHIEVE and Community Transformation) in Social Marketing, Policy, Systems and Environmental Change, and evaluation methods allow the EHHD to be effective and efficient in meeting grant deliverables and making an impact in the community with subsequent initiatives.

This proposal to address risk factors for high blood pressure among adults in the member towns by increasing blood pressure awareness and providing tools to address modifiable risk factors, fits into the EHHD's overall mission to prevent illness and promote wellness by addressing an identified need in a population demonstrating a higher-than-state incidence of risk factors for stroke and heart disease.

Furthermore, funding through the Preventative Health Block Grant has been an important resource over the past 20 years to the EHHD community, as this funding supports progress towards meeting and complying with CGS 19a-207a. The EHHD has a strong history of dedicated staff (funded through this resource) and eager community partners to leverage the Preventative Health Block Grant funds for sustainable outcomes. These outcomes are building blocks for continued policy, program and environmental changes that improve health outcomes in member towns.

2. Scope of Services

To increase control of high blood pressure in adults, the EHHD proposes to provide opportunities for self-monitoring available to the identified priority population utilizing evidence-based programs. Furthermore, this project will utilize existing qualified staff and community partnerships across multiple sectors to achieve objectives and implement strategies, including a single EHHD staff member to coordinate all grant activities.

LOCAL NEED: The Connecticut Cardiovascular Diseases Statistics Report, 2021 (Estimates of Cardiovascular Diseases and Their Burden in Connecticut) identifies the main risk factors for cardiovascular diseases as high blood pressure, high blood cholesterol, and smoking. According to the report, "an estimated 30.9% of Connecticut adults have been told by a health professional that they have high blood pressure, and 34.5% of adults have had their cholesterol checked and have been told by a health professional that it was high.[BRFSS 2027 & 2019] Approximately 12.0% of Connecticut adults are current cigarette smokers. [2018-2020 Connecticut Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS) Data]". The conclusion of this report was that "cardiovascular diseases and their risk factors impose a great burden on Connecticut. However, the state and local health departments, healthcare systems, communities, and individuals can collaborate to lessen this burden. Implementing and participating in evidence-based strategies that prevent, manage, or delay cardiovascular diseases and their risk factors will lessen the burden and improve the health of Connecticut residents."

The EHHD seeks to be a partner with the State in implementing evidence-based strategies to lessen the burden of stroke and heart disease in Northeastern Connecticut. Community Health Assessments capturing our population from Johnson Memorial Hospital (2022), Windham Hospital (2022) and the ECHN (2019) are additional resources on the impact of modifiable risk factors and the resulting outcomes of heart disease and stroke in our region.

Focusing on the Healthy People 2030 Objective to Increase the Control of High Blood Pressure, the EHHD will address a significant issue in the community. The American Heart Association refers to high blood pressure as the 'silent killer', and points out in their website "many people with high blood pressure don't even know they have it. Often the signs and symptoms are misunderstood." An online Food and Drug Administration article, "High Blood Pressure—Understanding the Silent Killer" states:

Early detection of high blood pressure is very important. Often referred to as the "silent killer" because it may show no symptoms, high blood pressure puts you at an increased risk for heart disease, heart failure, and stroke, among other things.

The incidence of death in member towns of the EHHD for cardiovascular events is among the highest in the state, providing an opportunity to improve outcomes in this geographic area. According to the <u>CDC</u> Interactive Atlas of heart disease and stroke from 2018 through 2020 for all adults 35 and older:

- The death rate total cardiovascular disease in Windham County was greater than 367 per 100,000 (highest in state); in Tolland County, it was greater than 361 per 100,000 (second highest in state)
- The death rate for high blood pressure in Windham County was greater than 182 per 100,000 (highest in state)
- The death rate for 'all heart disease' in Windham County was greater than 298 per 100,000 (highest in state) and in Tolland County, it was greater than 280 per 100,000 (2nd highest)

The data show there are a disproportionate number of residents in the EHHD member towns with a wide range of risk factors that play into this high death rate. For example, the Town Equity Reports (2021) from DataHaven expose some of the disparities in our rural Northeastern Connecticut communities, highlighting the need to address risk factors for stroke and heart disease. According to DataHaven, notable high rates of modifiable risk factors in the EHHD include:

- High blood pressure in adults is higher than 23% in seven of ten towns in the EHHD
- Diabetes is higher than 23% of adults in half of the EHHD member towns
- Rate of smoking in two EHHD member towns significantly exceeds the state average for all adults; it is 29% higher in Ashford (Windham County) and 43% higher in Coventry (Tolland County) than the state rate of 14%

TARGET POPULATION: This proposed project will target adults ages 50 and older with at least two modifiable risk factors outside the normal range (inactivity, smoking, poor eating, high blood pressure, or overweight).

Refining the priority population for this proposed intervention to adults age 50 or older is backed by data from the 2021 Connecticut Healthy Aging Community Profile. The report highlights the extent of risk factors for stroke and coronary heart disease in EHHD member towns including

- The rates of hypertension among residents 65 and older is 70% or higher for Andover, Ashford, Bolton, Chaplin, Columbia (79%), Coventry, Mansfield, Scotland, Tolland (75%), Willington
- Willington has a worse-than-state rate for ischemic heart disease (44.6%) and three additional towns have rates just below the state rate (Columbia 40.6%, Scotland 38.7% and Tolland 39.2%)
- All EHHD member towns have a smoking rate for ages 60 and older that exceeds the state rate for that age group, with 80% of towns exceeding the state rate by 35%
- Chaplin & Scotland (Windham County towns in the EHHD) have rates for diabetes at 35.6% (ranking worst, #126 out of all Connecticut towns)
- Chaplin & Scotland (Windham County towns in the EHHD) have rates for COPD at 24% (ranking worst, #129 out of all Connecticut towns)
- Rates for "ever had heart attack" identify Coventry at 6.4% (ranking worst #162 out of all Connecticut towns) and Chaplin & Scotland at 5.8% (ranking worst #151 out of all towns)
- Rates for Ischemic Heart Disease identify Willington at 44.6% (ranking worst #144 out of all Connecticut towns)

The Burden of Cardiovascular Disease in Connecticut, 2010, (most recent available from DPH), states:

"Risk factors for CVD may be modifiable or non-modifiable. Key modifiable risk factors are high blood pressure, high blood cholesterol, smoking, diabetes, obesity, and physical inactivity....High blood pressure (HBP) is a major risk factor for heart attack and stroke. Targeted, evidence-based public health interventions are warranted for all Connecticut residents with multiple risk factors."

Furthermore, leaning into local Community Health Needs Assessments (CHNA) completed in the region confirms the approach and direction of this proposal. The ECHN CHNA completed in 2019 identified the mortality rate for heart disease in Tolland, Andover and Willington as higher than the state rate.

Additionally, the focus group theme on heart disease and nutrition produced the following

recommendations: "the need for prevention education, desire for information regarding walking and biking access and access to services after work or on weekends". The Hartford Health Care (Windham Hospital) CHNA completed in June, 2022 prioritized needs includes focused initiatives addressing chronic health conditions noted as "data-based greatest impact on health outcomes". Towns represented in this HHC CHNA include five EHHD member towns: Chaplin, Columbia, Coventry, Mansfield and Scotland.

The program design will address the Healthy People 2030 objective to increase control of high blood pressure by implementing the following strategies that are supported by the accompanying budget plan.


STRATEGIES: The EHHD will implement self-monitoring blood pressure strategies from evidence-based initiatives to address this public health concern as described below. Through these strategies, the EHHD will enable residents in the identified priority population to monitor their blood pressure at home and receive resources and encouragement to address modifiable risk factors for stroke and coronary heart disease. The proposed project will utilize and disseminate CDC and DPH prevention campaign materials whenever possible. Furthermore, the EHHD has a small carry-over (approximately \$5,000) of funding to support policy and environmental change to address chronic disease from the ACHIEVE initiative that can supplement outreach efforts for this initiative.

Self-Monitoring Blood Pressure Strategies to be implemented:

- Educational programs at convenient locations (senior centers, libraries, fire stations) in member towns presented by an EHHD registered nurse, utilizing the Self-Measured Blood Pressure Monitoring Toolkit developed in 2023 by the National Association of Community Health Centers (https://www.nachc.org/wp-content/uploads/2020/12/SMBP-Toolkit_FINAL.pdf)
- Library loan of automated blood pressure monitors utilizing the best practice, "Check Out a Book, Check Out a Blood Pressure Kit!" presented by the <u>Public Health National Center for</u> Innovations and the American Heart Association

3. School-based monitoring stations for staff to self-check their blood pressure during a school day in the nurses' office with supporting educational materials available to staff.

The EHHD envisions these three aspects of access to self-monitoring of blood pressure and engagement within the community to elevate awareness and access to resources leading to improved high blood pressure control. Promotion and referrals for each component of the Self-Monitoring Blood Pressure project will support the others: School access will mention library loan availability (for home monitoring if



needed) and the upcoming educational programs in the community. The library loan program will include availability of educational programs. Promotion for educational programs will include the promotion of the library loan, while the promotion of library loan program will include educational program opportunities. The EHHD will also engage local health care providers to be a referral point (for both sending referrals to available community resources and for those without a PCP to be able to access a healthcare professional if they have questions or concerns about their blood pressure home readings). Letters of support from sectors contributing to the success of this initiative include local health care providers, schools, libraries, senior centers and Town Managers are in Attachment E.

To address inequalities and reach the Health District's rural and somewhat insulated population, educational programs will be offered in locations that are "friendly forums" for the targeted audience. Through partnerships with local senior centers, volunteer fire stations, Fish and Game clubs and town libraries, the intervention has great potential to reach adults who have the greatest need for resources and support. Complementing this educational program component, the implementation of a library loan for blood pressure monitors (an evidence-based intervention) and school-based resources for staff will improve blood pressure awareness and facilitate the early intervention in the event of high blood pressure, and further the reach of access to the tools needed to address risk factors. Letters of support from town senior centers, libraries and schools are included in this proposal, assuring success of each component presented in this application.

Educational programs will be presented by an EHHD registered nurse and cover several areas of modifiable risk factors as well as important information about blood pressure, how to take accurate readings at home, and when to reach out to their health care provider regarding blood pressure readings that are above normal. These in-person programs provide a teachable moment for the target

audience and dissemination of CDC and DPH prevention campaign materials regarding smoking cessation, the DASH diet (weight control, hypertension) and increasing physical activity (providing an opportunity to promote the EHHD Active Living Projects as well as other free or low cost resources in the community to get active) will be incorporated in the curriculum.

This proposal supports multiple Essential Public Health Services as identified by the CDC including:

- Monitor health status to identify and solve community health problems
- Inform, educate, and empower people about health issues
- Mobilize community partnerships and action to identify and solve health problems
- Develop policies and plans that support individual and community health efforts
- Evaluate effectiveness, accessibility, and quality of personal and population-based health services

WORK PLAN

Current EHHD staff will manage and implement all aspects of the Self-Monitoring Blood Pressure project. Key personnel have the background, experience, knowledge, and community awareness to meet the stated objectives and achieve positive outcomes. The lead project manager for this proposed initiative (Ande Bloom) has extensive grant experience in the community with health promotion and education. The Health District registered nurse (Courtney LeBlanc) has significant community outreach and public health awareness experience, and will provide educational programs. This internal team at EHHD has worked together throughout the past three years to effectively create targeted messaging, develop educational materials, and promote healthy eating and active living initiatives in an effective manner.

To achieve the goal of this grant project to increase control of high blood pressure in the EHHD community, collaboration with partners across sectors in the community will be implemented. The Self-Monitoring Blood Pressure project proposed by the EHHD will engage leaders from town senior centers, town libraries, town fire departments, local schools and area Fish and Game clubs to identify locations and create programming that is relevant to and appropriate for the priority population. For this grant, the priority population is adults over the age of 50 with two or more risk factors for stroke or heart disease. The identified sectors are key to addressing the priority population because they have the greatest opportunity for personal connections to the target group.

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The two main components of outreach (educational programs with take-home blood pressure monitors provided to participants and a library loan of a blood pressure monitor) will mirror evidence-based programs and utilize CDC and DPH prevention campaign materials. Throughout the grant period, an approach of continual quality improvement will be implemented with each intervention being evaluated through a "Plan-Do-Study-Act" cycle. Additional evaluation and assessment of outcomes will be included in both main components with pre and post-tests used to measure individual knowledge and change, as well as monthly follow-up with program participants. Each of these steps affords the opportunity to refine the approach or materials to maximize outcomes during the grant period and beyond. Lessons learned and aggregate data from each year of the program implementation will be shared at annual gatherings with program partners and participants and with the DPH. A detailed work plan is attached in the Appendices (E).

Goal: Increase control of high blood pressure in adults

Objective 1: Create educational materials for Self-Monitoring Blood Pressure sessions that are culturally appropriate for priority population educational sessions by February 1, 2024

Strategies:

- 1. Research available evidence-based program resources from online resources
- 2. Collaborate with local partners (senior centers, town social services, town librarians) to assure materials address known risk factors of importance and are culturally relevant

Objective 2: Conduct educational Self-Monitoring Blood Pressure program at 36 community locations reaching 360 EHHD residents in priority population by August 30, 2028

Strategies:

- Engage with community partners (senior centers, fire departments, Fish and Game Clubs, libraries) to identify educational program sites
- Blood pressure self-monitoring and stroke risk reduction educational classes are scheduled at 36 local sites at times/days most likely to incur participation
- 3. Promotion of classes and recruitment based on targeted priority population occurs in the weeks prior to scheduled class
- 3. Educational program lasting 1.5 hours is provided at 36 sites to an average of 10 qualifying participants at each class (over age 50 with 2 or more risk factors for heart disease or stroke)

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Objective 3: Engage with school nurses to identify locations for blood pressure monitors at school for approximately 1,100 staff members to use at 15 schools by January 15, 2028.

Strategies:

- 1. Identification of schools willing to provide access to BP monitors
- 2. BP monitors and educational materials are provided to schools willing to participate in initiative
- 3. Implement protocol and resources for school-based staff blood pressure monitoring

Objective 4: Implement a Self-Monitor Blood Pressure library loan program at 2 town Libraries by May 15, 2028.

Strategies:

- 1. Recruit libraries to participate in program by sharing an overview of blood pressure monitor loan program as described in existing literature of this evidence-based initiative
- 2. Provide materials (blood pressure monitors and educational materials) to participating libraries
- 3. Conduct on-going community awareness campaign and promotion of blood pressure monitoring loan program

Objective 5: Conduct evaluation of project each month throughout the grant period (September 30, 2028) through specific measures for each component as described below.

Strategies:

- Conduct pre and post assessments with each participant during educational programs to assess knowledge and risk factors
- 2. After attending educational program, follow up with participants monthly to assess knowledge, risk factors, utilization of home blood pressure monitor
- Survey school nurses each month to assess utilization of blood pressure monitors and any anecdotal evidence available regarding impact of resource
- 4. Evaluation measures are implemented including library staff surveys (assessing monthly utilization of blood pressure monitors) and pre/post use from patrons who wish to participate to assess knowledge and risk factors

3. Staffing Plan

All staffing for this proposal will be current EHHD employees who have the experience, training and availability to meet all grant deliverables and produce successful outcomes based on the identified work plan. Resumes for key personnel for this proposal (which describe the depth and extent of training and experience) are attached.

- Program Coordinator: Ande Bloom, a current full-time EHHD employee with extensive
 experience working with DPH grants and other large grant projects will have duties re-assigned
 so that this grant can be managed and expectations of DPH met for meetings and trainings as
 scheduled.
- Project Nurse: Courtney LeBlanc, RN, a current full-time EHHD employee with years of public
 health experience as well as home health, patient education and counseling. There is flexibility
 to include duties from this grant in assigned weekly hours. The first year of the grant reflects
 fewer hours to mirror fewer educational sessions as the project gets launched. Hours are
 increased in years two through five.
- EHHD Community Health and Wellness Coordinator: Cecile Serazo, RN will provide overall supervision of this project that falls within her program management purview.

4. Data and Technology

The EHHD has a well-established technology access to servers, electronic file maintenance and security and communication (email, phone, web conferences) and an IT department supporting all technology to maintain effectiveness as a health district and for this grant as demonstrated from recent grants and grant activity with DPH. Furthermore, the ability of the EHHD to provide required reports, success stories and respond to data requests has been well-documented over the years of grant-related interactions with DPH.

In terms of referencing and researching relevant sources that can inform the implementation and outcomes of this grant proposal, the EHHD has utilized national and state resources for current health data, Community Health Needs Assessments from regional hospitals and national models for the programs that will be the best fit for the EHHD community from best practices across the country.

The e-mail system is a Microsoft Exchange Enterprise system that is actively managed and monitored by our two expert Microsoft Exchange system administrators and hosted in a centralized data center that has multiple redundancies. The system is regularly patched to ensure it is fully up-to-date and compliant. All e-mail is backed up on three different redundant systems to safeguard the data.

All Health District workstations (computers) run Microsoft Windows 10 Professional. These systems are automatically and frequently patched to ensure they are on the latest and most secure patch level. Similarly, the Health District's servers are Windows Enterprise servers that are frequently patched to ensure they are highly secure. All servers reside behind multiple firewalls as well. For software, Microsoft Office is the productivity suite, Claris FileMaker is the internal database, and cloud hosted vendor provided systems are utilized. All systems run anti-malware / anti-virus software.

The Health District has a highly professional and qualified I.T. management team. Specifically, the I.T. Director is Mr. Jaime Russell (RussellJL@mansfieldct.org and 860-429-3383). Mr. Russell has two decades of I.T. experience in public sector enterprise networks and has advanced degrees from Central Connecticut State University and the University of Connecticut.





Background

The Water System Advisory Committee (WSAC) was formed by the Connecticut Water Company in 2014 as part of the agreement with the Town of Mansfield to facilitate the interconnection of Connecticut Water and the UConn community water system. The committee includes representatives of the Town of Mansfield, UConn, Town of Coventry, and the Town of Tolland, and serves in an advisory role to Connecticut Water as it expands its services area to customers outside of the University of Connecticut in Mansfield and other future public water customers in the community.

The committee's charge is to "provide local input and ensure communication and collaboration relating to the water system, system improvements, local planning, economic development, water and land conservation, and environmental stewardship" according to the Memorandum of Agreement between The Connecticut Water Company and the Town of Mansfield.

Pursuant to the above referenced memorandum of agreement, the Eastern Highlands Health District has one voting representative on the committee with a two year term.

The Directors appointed term has expired.

Recommendation

Re-appointing the Director of Health to the WSAC is respectfully recommended.

If the board concurs then the following motion is in order: Move, to appoint Director of Health, Robert Miller, to the Water System Advisory Committee for the term ending June 15, 2025, effective immediately.

Background

In 2015 the Connecticut DPH notified the EHHD Board urging them to execute agreements with other local health departments to ensure that local public health services are maintained during a Director of Health absence. In response to this the board in April of 2015 passed the following motion, "Move, to authorize the Director to execute the Acting Director of Health Services Agreement by and between the Eastern Highlands Health Districts and any other Connecticut Local Health Department/District deemed qualified by the Director." A number of agreements have since been executed by this office with our neighboring local health departments.

Given the age of the above referenced authorization, and a policy change by the CT DPH regarding these agreements, it is appropriate for the Board to act to re-authorize the execution of these agreements. Specifically, the CT DPH is now requiring execution by **both** the Director of Health and the Board Chair.

Attached for your review is an updated Acting Director of Health Services Agreement By and Between the Eastern Highlands Health District and the Ledge Light Health District. Other then the addition of the Board Chair Signature fields, there are no changes to the terms of this agreement.

Recommendation

I am respectfully recommending that the board authorize both the Director of Health, and the Board Chair to execute this agreement and any future updated acting director of health services agreements.

If the board concurs, the following motion is in order: Move, to authorize both the Director, and the Board of Directors Chairman to execute the Acting Director of Health Services Agreement by and between the Eastern Highlands Health Districts and any other Connecticut Local Health Department/District deemed qualified by the Director.

ACTING DIRECTOR OF HEALTH SERVICES AGREEMENT

By and Between the

Eastern Highlands Health District And Ledge Light Health District

WHEREAS, the Eastern Highlands Health District is a regional governmental entity providing public health services to the Towns of Andover, Ashford, Bolton, Chaplin, Columbia, Coventry, Mansfield, Scotland, Tolland and Willington; and,

WHEREAS, the Ledge Light Health District is a government entity providing public health services to the Town(s) of East Lyme, Groton, Ledyard, Lyme, New London, North Stonington, Old Lyme, Stonington, and Waterford;

WHEREAS, each party may from time to time require the services of an Acting Director of Health for the purpose of performing day-to-day oversight of agency activities as more particularly described herein; and

WHEREAS, each party to this agreement desires to establish provisions for the commencement and sharing of Acting Director of Health services to other party during periods of planned Director of Health absences; and

NOW, THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the parties mutually agree as follows:

SECTION I. DEFINITIONS

"Agreement" means the Acting Director of Health Services Agreement.

"Party" means an entity that has officially approved and adopted this agreement.

"Provider" means a party to this agreement that furnishes, and is requested to furnish, Acting Director of Health services to a recipient pursuant to this agreement.

"Recipient" means a party that requests and receives Acting Director of Health services from a provider pursuant to this agreement.

SECTION II. PROCEDURES FOR REQUESTING AND GRANTING ACTING DIRECTOR OF HEALTH SERVICES

Acting Director of Health services shall be requested as set forth in this agreement. Either party may request Acting Director of Health services by communicating a request to the other party, indicating the request is made pursuant to this agreement. Each request shall be accompanied with the term information, in writing or by other available means. Neither party is obligated under this agreement to grant and provide Acting Director of Health services

upon request. Granted requests shall be accompanied by confirmation in writing or by other available means.

SECTION III. SCOPE OF ACTING DIRECTOR OF HEALTH SERVICES

Provide day-to-day oversight to the recipient agency, including but not limited to, supporting recipient agency staff, providing consulting, advisory and administrative directions and recommendations, as may be needed, including but not limited to attending meetings, acting as a duly authorized signatory for needed orders, letters and the like. The Acting Director shall be available as needed by telephone, cell phone and email for purposes of rendering services to the recipient agency staff regarding day-to-day activities and other situations that may arise.

SECTION III. RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES OF PROVIDER'S DIRECTOR OF HEALTH

Whenever a Director of Health is providing services pursuant to this agreement, such Director of Health shall retain the same powers, duties, obligations, immunities and privileges they would ordinarily possess if performing their duties within the geographical limits of the provider.

SECTION IV. INDEMNIFICATION

Each party hereby releases, relinquishes, discharges and agrees to indemnify, protect and save harmless the other party, its officers, agents and employees, from any and all claims, suits, actions, demands and liability for any cost, loss damage or injury to property of every name and description (whether it be that of either of the parties hereto or of their persons) and to persons (whether they be third persons or agents or employees of either of the parties hereto), including court costs and legal fees. Each party will not be liable for the other in terms of any loss, damage or injury occasioned by the sole negligence its agents or employees.

Each party shall give to the other prompt written notice of any claim made or suit instituted, which in any way directly or indirectly, contingently or otherwise, may affect the other party. Each party shall have the right to compromise and defend the same to the extent of its interest therein. Such indemnity as provided above shall not be limited by reasons of the extent of any insurance coverage.

SECTION V. INITIAL DURATION OF AGREEMENT, RENEWAL AND TERMINATION

This agreement shall be binding for not less than one (1) year from its effective date, unless terminated upon at least sixty (60) days written notice by a party as set forth below. Thereafter, this agreement shall continue to be binding upon the parties in subsequent years and shall be considered to renew automatically from year to year, unless terminated by written notification as provided above. A party terminating their participation in this agreement shall submit a copy of their written termination notice. A party's termination of this agreement shall not affect a party's reimbursement obligations or any other liability or obligation incurred under the terms of this agreement. Once a termination is effective, a terminated entity shall no longer be a party to this agreement.

SECTION VI. STATUTORY AND REGULATORY COMPLIANCE

Each party shall comply with all pertinent provisions of local, state, and federal laws and regulations applicable to services rendered. Each party agrees to the following provisions required pursuant to Section 4a-60a of the Conn. Gen. Statutes: Non-discrimination regarding sexual orientation (a) (1), (2), (3) and (4). Each party agrees to comply with Executive Order No. 16: Violence in the Workplace Prevention Policy. Each party agrees to comply with Section 1-84(m) of the Conn. Gen. Statutes: Prohibits vendors from knowingly giving gifts to state employees.

SECTION VII. EFFECTIVE DATE, APPROVAL AND ADOPTION

This agreement shall take effect upon approval and adoption by the entity seeking to become a party to the agreement.

Connecticut Department of Public Health recommends residents be cautious about exercise and outdoor activities due to the poor air quality

HARTFORD, Conn.— With the unhealthy air quality from elevated levels of smoke from the wildfires in Canada, the Connecticut Department of Public Health is recommending that people with asthma or heart and lung conditions avoid outdoor exercise today.

"The health effects for some people may include chest tightness, shortness of breath, wheezing, coughing, eye irritation, chest pain, dizziness or lightheadedness, and other symptoms," said DPH Commissioner Manisha Juthani, MD. 'We recommend that you avoid any outdoor exercise today if you have an underlying health condition. Be sure to have your medications readily available and seek medical attention if these issues worsen."

Commissioner Juthani added that closing windows and doors will help keep smoke out of the home. Children, the elderly, and those with asthma or heart and lung conditions are most at risk for experiencing symptoms from elevated air pollution that is expected today. Even healthy adults who spend prolonged periods outdoors working or exercising should minimize their outdoor exertion because poor air quality can impact even those not considered vulnerable.

The Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protections monitors the state's air quality and posts air quality forecasts each day on the Air Quality Index (AQI). CT DPH encourages schools, day care providers, summer camps and elder care/senior centers to subscribe to the <u>Air Quality Index (ct.gov)</u>. Subscribing is fast and easy and will provide you with important information each day about Connecticut's air quality throughout the spring and summer.

Greetings EHHD Community Partners – As many of you are aware, Connecticut is experiencing unusually diminished air quality due to wild fires in Canada. Based on the information below and attached from CT DEMHS these conditions are expected to continue through today, and may intensify in the afternoon today. Below are links to the CT DEEP and the EPA websites, which provide more detailed information on air quality measures in the region.

Also attached is the EPA guide to Air Quality Index (AQI) guidance precautions for individuals, and Key Facts to Know About Particulate Pollution.

The current AQI for our area is 156. This is categorized as "Unhealthy" or "Red" level. Here is the EPA guidance for an AQI at an unhealthy level:

Have flexibility in your schedule?

If the forecast is Red (unhealthy), there may still be times during the day when air quality is OK for outdoor activities. Check *current air quality* to see if now is a good time for you to be active outdoors.

Can't change your schedule?

People with heart or lung disease, older adults, children and teens: Reduce your exposure by avoiding strenuous outdoor activities or keeping outdoor activities short. Consider moving physical activities indoors.

Everyone else: Reduce your exposure by choosing less strenuous activities or shortening the amount of time you are active outdoors.

This office will push out any additional information as it becomes available.

10:15 JUNE 7, 2023 UPDATE

As of 10:15 smoke from the Canadian wildfires continues to be present here in Connecticut. Air quality conditions are currently deemed "unhealthy" with AQI values of 150-170PM2.5.

We are monitoring an area of very dense smoke positioned throughout Upstate New York and northern Pennsylvania as shown in the satellite imagery to the right. This area of dense smoke is modeled to move into Connecticut over the next few hours with higher smoke density expected than what was observed yesterday.

AQI values will likely stay between 150-200PM2.5 however within the highest concentrations of smoke the AQI level could possibly increase to "very unhealthy" with is an AQI value over 200PM2.5

The Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) has issued an Air Quality Action Day for fine particulates from through midnight tonight. An Air Quality Action Day means that fine particulate concentrations within the region may approach or exceed unhealthy standards.

The highest concentrations of smoke is expected to stay in Connecticut through the evening and into the early morning hours of Thursday. Lower concentrations of smoke will linger through much of Thursday.

DESPP / DEMHS will continue to monitor conditions and provide any updates as warranted

What is particle pollution?

Particle pollution comes from many different sources. Fine particles (2.5 micrometers in diameter and smaller) come from power plants, industrial processes, vehicle tailpipes, woodstoves, and wildfires. Coarse particles (between 2.5 and 10 micrometers) come from crushing and grinding operations, road dust, and some agricultural operations.

Why is particle pollution a problem?

Particle pollution causes a number of serious health problems, including coughing, wheezing, reduced lung function, asthma attacks, heart attacks and strokes. It also is linked to early death in people with heart or lung disease.

Do I need to be concerned?

It's always smart to pay attention to your air quality, but it's especially true for people who may be at greater risk. They include:

- · People with heart disease.
- People with lung disease, including asthma and Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD).
- Older adults.
- Children and teenagers because their lungs are still developing, and they breathe more air per pound of body weight than adults.
- · Pregnant people.
- · Minority populations.
- · Outdoor workers.

How can I protect myself?

Use AQI forecasts, available on AirNow.gov to plan outdoor activities. On days when the AQI is forecast to be unhealthy, check AirNow for your current air quality and take simple steps to reduce your exposure, including:

- · Choose a less intense activity.
- Shorten your outdoor activities.
- Reschedule activities.
- · Exercise away from busy roads.

When particle levels are high outdoors, they can be high indoors too.

Keep particles lower indoors:

- Reduce your <u>use of fireplaces and wood stoves</u>. And don't use candles or smoke indoors.
- Use <u>HEPA air filters (https://www.epa.gov/indoor-air-quality-iaq)</u> in your HVAC system.
- Buy or make your own portable air cleaner designed to reduce particles indoors.

Can I help reduce particle pollution? Yes! Here are a few tips.

- Drive less: bike or walk, carpool, use public transportation.
- Use energy efficiently; choose ENERGY STAR certified products.
- For cleaner heat, upgrade to a heat pump, electric heat, or ductless heat pumps.
- Keep car, boat and other engines tuned.
- If you use wood for heat, burn it efficiently. Check <u>EPA's Burn Wise Program</u> for tips (www.epa.gov/burnwise).
- Don't burn leaves, garbage, plastic or rubber.



Regular physical activity — at least 60 minutes each day — promotes health and fitness. The table below shows when and how to modify outdoor physical activity based on the Air Quality Index. This guidance can help protect the health of all children, including teenagers, who are more sensitive than adults to air pollution. Check the air quality daily at www.airnow.gov.

If symptoms occur:

The student might need to take a break, do a less intense activity, stop all activity, go indoors, or use quick-relief medicine as prescribed. If symptoms don't improve, get medical help.

As of 17:00 very dense smoke from the Canadian wildfires continues to be present here in Connecticut. The densest smoke is positioned through portions of southwestern Connecticut as seen

on the map to the right. Air quality conditions have deteriorated drastically with 'hazardous' air quality values being reported in Bridgeport and the immediate surrounding area which is the highest level of the scale. The AQI level in Bridgeport is currently 313ug/m3 which is the highest recorded value in Connecticut since EPA records started in 1999. The previous highest recorded value was 166ug/m3 just yesterday.

New Haven, Fairfield and southern Litchfield counties are currently experiencing 'very unhealthy' AQI values while Hartford, Tolland, northern Litchfield, Middlesex, New London, and Windham counties are experiencing unhealthy conditions.

AQI values are projected to remain between unhealthy and hazardous through the overnight hours with some relief expected to work in Thursday morning and falling values through the day on Thursday.





GROUP QUESTION: How are rural areas in Connecticut defined/viewed and why is the delivery and access to care unique to these regions when compared to urban or more suburban towns?

Issue Areas to discuss:

1. Health Equity

- Q1: What are challenges facing health equity in this region of Connecticut and who is most impacted? Why is there such a divide in the access to quality care?
- Q2: What has been done and what can be done to close the gap in access to quality care and ensure the burdens on healthcare are more equitably distributed?
- Q3: What role does each stakeholder—legislators, advocates and healthcare providers—play in addressing inequities in rural healthcare accessibility and affordability?

2. Accessibility (transportation, access to variety of locations & internet access)

- Q1: We sometimes find that even when people have access to highquality health coverage - they don't have the ability to utilize that coverage, whether it's due to lack of available transportation or lack of access to digital technology in their homes. How do we address this?
- Q2: The pandemic showed us that we can see a doctor virtually and safely from the comfort of our own home. As we see the healthcare landscape and specifically telemedicine alter the delivery of care, how can these tools help to provide access to quality care? What are some of the cons of this type of delivery?
- Q3: The old saying is "if you build it, they will come," but if residents in rural areas cannot physically get to their doctor or nearby hospital (and vice versa), or have no access to digital technology, the sustainability of these care centers are impacted. What can we do increase transportation, provide greater connectivity via transit or fiber optics?

3. Affordability

- Q1: Are there cost drivers unique to rural areas that are dramatically increasing the cost of accessing or delivering care?
- Q2: For healthcare professionals, are you finding that the cost of care in this area is impacting the health of patients—such as putting off routine visits or delaying needed surgeries? For residents, are you finding yourselves pushing those procedures further down the road, perhaps due to fear of being burdened by medical debt?
- Q3: What can we do to bring down the cost of care in rural areas? What has been done to successfully lower costs and what just hasn't been effective?

4. Lack of specialists/consolidation

• Q1: Is it expensive or not financially feasible to operate specialty care of even a PCP in rural regions? Are smaller practices being acquired by larger health groups and if so, what has the impact of this been?

• Q2: a more mobile model—such as traveling nurses—help to address the lack of specialty care? What can we do to spur more practices—large or small—to set up an operation in rural areas?

5. Workforce training/staff shortages & retention

- Q1. What are you seeing when it comes to training staff, hiring staff and keeping staff in Rural CT?
- Q2: What are the effects of staff shortages on healthcare delivery? What can be done to address it?
- Q3: Hospitals—not matter where they are located—are facing postpandemic burn out and shortages due to financial challenges. Connecticut has invested in workforce training and streamlined some red tape around the certification to practice but clearly more must be done. What are some innovative ideas that some rural hospitals have done elsewhere or what can done to spread resources more equitably?

6. Addiction services & mental health challenges

- Q1: Small towns and rural areas are hit hardest by the opioid crisis, region 3 according to DMHAS has the highest rates of drug and alcohol use and mental health challenges compared to other parts of the state, are there enough resources to combat these statistics especially when rural and small towns that make up this region are known to be the hardest hit for epidemic such as the opioid crisis?
- Q2: How do substance abuse treatment services vary between rural and urban areas? What impact did COVID have on mental health and substance abuse treatment? What are the risk factors for substance abuse in rural communities?

CDC ties sick workers to 40% of restaurant food poisoning cases

Food workers who showed up while sick or contagious were linked to about 40% of restaurant food poisoning outbreaks with a known cause between 2017 and 2019, federal health officials said Tuesday.

Norovirus and salmonella, germs that can cause severe illness, were the most common cause of 800 outbreaks, which encompassed 875 restaurants and were reported by 25 state and local health departments.

Investigators with the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention called for better enforcement of "comprehensive food safety policies," which emphasize basic measures like hand washing and keeping sick workers off the job.

Although 85% of restaurants said they had policies restricting staff from working while sick, only about 16% of the policies were detailed enough to require workers to notify managers and to stay home if they had any of the five key symptoms — including vomiting, diarrhea and sore throat with fever.

About 44% of managers told the CDC their restaurants provided paid sick leave to workers. That's a problem, according to Mitzi Baum, the chief executive of STOP Foodborne Illness, a nonprofit advocacy group.

She said it means workers are forced to choose between earning money or showing up sick — or there's social pressure not to leave fellow employees short-staffed.

About 48 million people a year in the U.S. are sickened by foodborne illness, including 128,000 who are hospitalized and 3,000 who die, according to the CDC.

Capitol rioter sentence: A Pennsylvania restaurant owner who screamed death threats directed at then-House Speaker Nancy Pelosi while storming the U.S. Capitol was sentenced Tuesday to more than two years in prison.

Pauline Bauer was near Pelosi's office suite on Jan. 6, 2021, when she yelled at police officers to bring out the California Democrat so the mob of Donald Trump supporters could hang her.

In January, U.S. District Judge Trevor McFadden convicted Bauer of riot-related charges after hearing trial testimony without a jury.

The judge sentenced her to two years and three months of imprisonment, giving her credit for the several months she already has served in jail, court records show.

More than a year before the trial, McFadden ordered Bauer to be jailed for several months for violating conditions of her release. She had claimed the court has no authority over her and told the judge that she doesn't want "any lawyering from the bench."

Biden remembrance: President Joe Biden marked Tuesday's eighth anniversary of one of the saddest days of his life, the death of his son Beau, by attending a memorial Mass and visiting his gravesite.

Biden, his wife, Jill, and other family members prayed for Beau Biden during the Mass in St. Joseph on the Brandywine, the Roman Catholic church where the president worships during weekends at his home near Wilmington, Delaware.

Afterward, the family visited Beau Biden's gravesite in the church cemetery. The president later traveled to Veterans Memorial Park in New Castle for his annual tradition of paying his respects and laying flowers.

Beau Biden was 46 when he died of brain cancer in 2015. His father was vice president at the time.

Christie campaign looms: Allies of former New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie have launched a new super PAC to support his expected candidacy for the Republican presidential nomination.

Christie has painted himself as the only potential candidate willing to directly take on former President Donald Trump, who is currently leading the GOP field by wide margins.

The former governor and federal prosecutor was a longtime friend and adviser to Trump but broke with the former president over his refusal to accept the results of the 2020 election, and has emerged as a leading Trump critic in the years since.

Christie, who is expected to enter the race "imminently," according to one person familiar with his thinking who, like others, spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss his plans, will likely face an uphill battle to the nomination if he goes through with a run.

He is currently polling at the bottom of the large candidate pack, and there appears to be little appetite in the party for an anti-Trump candidate, even as many Republican voters say they are open to an alternative.

Iowa building collapse: Five residents of a six-story apartment building that partially collapsed in Davenport, Iowa remained unaccounted for Tuesday, and

authorities feared at least two of them might be stuck inside rubble that was too dangerous to search.

The three other missing residents are not believed to have been in the building when it started collapsing Sunday afternoon, said state Rep. Monica Kurth.

After the partial collapse, the city had announced plans to begin demolishing the unstable remains of the 116-year-old brick-and-steel structure as early as Tuesday morning, but they delayed that after a woman was found Monday evening.

Officials now say immediate demolition was never intended, but they did want to quickly stage the site for the tear-down. The woman's rescue prompted officials to see if they could safely enter and ensure others weren't inside, but that is extremely difficult when the building could collapse at any time, they said.

NATO troops to Kosovo: NATO will send 700 more troops to northern Kosovo to help quell violent protests after clashes with ethnic Serbs there left 30 international soldiers wounded, the alliance announced Tuesday.

The latest violence in the region has stirred fear of a renewal of the 1998-99 conflict in Kosovo that claimed more than 10,000 lives and left more than 1 million people homeless.

The clashes grew out of a confrontation that unfolded last week after ethnic Albanian officials elected in votes overwhelmingly boycotted by Serbs entered municipal buildings to take office.

More violence followed on Monday when Serbs clashed with police and NATO peacekeepers.

Manson follower ruling: A California appeals court said Tuesday that Leslie Van Houten, who participated in two killings at the direction of cult leader Charles Manson in 1969, should be let out of prison on parole.

The appellate court's ruling reverses an earlier decision by Gov. Gavin Newsom, who rejected parole for Van Houten in 2020.

She has been recommended for parole five times since 2016.

Van Houten, now in her 70s, is serving a life sentence for helping Manson and other followers kill Leno LaBianca, a grocer in Los Angeles, and his wife, Rosemary. Van Houten was 19 at the time.

Free COVID-19 self-test kits will continue to be available at our main office at 4 South Eagleville Road, Mansfield, as long as supplies last.

With the end of the public health emergency I want to take this opportunity to thank our community partners for their support of our agency's efforts to protect the health of our residents during this public health crisis. It was truly an "all hands on deck", full community effort. Thank you.

Governor Lamont Announces Connecticut's COVID-19 Public Health Emergency Declaration Will End on May 11, Explains Impact on Related Services and Programs

(HARTFORD, CT) – Governor Ned Lamont today announced that the public health emergency declaration he initially signed on March 10, 2020, in response to the global outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic will terminate effective May 11, 2023 – the same date that President Joe Biden has directed the related federal public health emergency declaration to expire.

Governor Lamont's declaration has enabled Connecticut's executive branch to utilize certain emergency powers to address the crisis and provide more flexibility in a number of health-related areas, while also ensuring that federal resources in response to the pandemic could be delivered to the state. With the expiration of this declaration, the remaining policies enacted under it will also expire, and COVID-19 will be managed by state public health officials on an ongoing basis similar to other respiratory illnesses.

"Ending the COVID-19 public health emergency declaration does not mean that the virus has been eradicated," **Governor Lamont said**. "This declaration provided us with the tools needed to develop an immediate, urgent, and frontline response to the initial outbreak, and put in place the structure necessary to ensure the people of our state have the protections needed to respond to it. We have made much progress from where we were three years ago, and the workers in Connecticut's public health community have gone above and beyond at building a testing infrastructure, a vaccination program, a sophisticated disease reporting network, and a means to distribute therapeutics, PPE, and more than 1.5 million self-testing kits. I continue to urge Connecticut residents to take actions to protect themselves from the spread of COVID-19 and all respiratory viruses – stay home when you're sick, get vaccinated and boosted to limit your risk of contracting viruses, and listen to the advice of medical experts on ways to stay healthy."

"Although the public health emergency declaration is ending, residents still should get vaccinated, get the updated vaccine, use at-home tests, stay home when they're sick, and based on your own medical conditions, consider wearing a high-quality mask when respiratory viruses are circulating at high levels in their community. These are all ways we can continue to protect ourselves and manage this virus," Connecticut Department of Public Health Commissioner Manisha Juthani, MD, said. "We hope that COVID-19 will follow the trajectory of other seasonal illnesses, but we

certainly expect to once again ramp up our efforts during respiratory disease season, which typically runs from October through April."

Connecticut residents can expect the end of the federal and state declarations to have an impact on the following services and programs:

Testing for COVID-19

- Connecticut's remaining state-supported COVID-19 test sites, which are operating at four community health centers, will end on June 30, 2023.
- The costs of PCR tests for COVID-19 will begin transitioning to traditional health care
 coverage, similar to the way it is handled for other respiratory illnesses, and covered fully or in
 part by an individual's private insurance plan; publicly funded programs such as Medicare and
 Medicaid; or directly by consumers.
- The costs of at-home, self-test kits for COVID-19 will also transition to traditional health care coverage, in which it is covered fully or in part by a private or public insurance plan, or directly by consumers. For a limited time, the federal government continues to offer the ability of U.S. households to request a shipment of free self-test kits which can be obtained by filling out a form at <u>covid.gov/tests</u> however that program is dependent on available supply and is likely to end soon.

Vaccinations for COVID-19

- The costs of receiving COVID-19 vaccines and boosters will begin transitioning to traditional health care coverage, similar to the way these are handled for other types of illnesses, and covered fully or in part by an individual's private or public insurance plan, or directly by consumers. However, it is anticipated that most private and public insurance plans will continue covering all costs of COVID-19 vaccinations and boosters without a co-pay or cost-share for consumers.
- The federal government plans on distributing all of the remaining COVID-19 vaccines and boosters it currently has in its inventory to vaccine providers (such as retail pharmacies and health care providers), which are then provided to individuals at no cost, until that inventory is depleted or expires.
- The Connecticut Department of Public Health will end its mobile COVID-19 vaccination clinic program on June 30, 2023. Any organization that is interested in hosting a clinic before the program ends must submit a request to the department by June 19, 2023, at ct.gov/coronavirus.
- The Connecticut Department of Public Health will end its homebound COVID-19 vaccination
 program on June 30, 2023. After this date, COVID-19 vaccines and boosters will be provided
 to individuals who are homebound similar to the way the seasonal influenza vaccine and other
 preventative health care services are offered. Individuals who are homebound should contact
 their health care provider to receive these services.

Therapeutics for COVID-19

The costs of receiving treatments for COVID-19 such as Paxlovid and Lagevrio will begin
transitioning to traditional health care coverage, similar to the costs one may incur for other
drugs and treatments, and covered fully or in part by an individual's private or public insurance
plan, or directly by consumers.

Support for long-term care facilities in response to COVID-19

 The Connecticut Department of Public Health will continue to support long-term care facilities in helping to identify any COVID-19 outbreaks. The department is committed to offering education and training for outbreak control to protect the state's most vulnerable individuals.

Program waivers for the Women, Infants, and Children Program (WIC)


 WIC program waivers will end 90 days after the declarations are terminated, which is August 9, 2023. The Connecticut Department of Public Health will soon announce more information on this topic.

Data reports on COVID-19

- The Connecticut Department of Public Health will transition its data reporting on COVID-19
 testing, hospitalizations, deaths, and vaccination rates to the same reporting period it uses
 under its seasonal respiratory surveillance reporting program, which usually begins each year
 in early October and ends in late May or early June.
- This means that the department will issue its final COVID-19 data report for the 2022-2023 respiratory viral disease season on June 1, 2023. The 2023-2024 reporting period will begin on October 5, 2023, and end in late May or early June of 2024.
- This new COVID-19 data report will include data that are relevant to current COVID-19 disease activity and trends and integrate COVID-19 with viral respiratory surveillance reporting, including influenza.

Ongoing communications related to COVID-19 will continue to be published on the Connecticut Department of Public Health's website at ct.gov/dph. Additionally, the most up-to-date federal guidance on COVID-19 is available on the Center for Disease Control and Prevention's website at cdc.gov/coronavirus.

Dear Colleagues:

May 11, 2023, marks the end of the federal public health emergency declaration for COVID-19. Changes are needed to the List of Reportable Diseases, Emergency Illnesses and Health Conditions and the List of Reportable Laboratory Findings to ensure continuity of surveillance data and to align with federal reporting requirements.

As Commissioner of DPH, I hereby amend these lists as follows: COVID-19-associated deaths are added to the List of Reportable Diseases, Emergency Illnesses and Health Conditions and <u>negative</u> SARS-CoV-2 results are removed from the List Reportable of Laboratory Findings. Positive SARS-CoV-2 NAAT and antigen test results will continue to be reportable from locations testing under a CLIA certificate or certificate of waiver. This action is taken pursuant to Connecticut General Statues Section 19a-2a and Section 19a-215 and Section 19a-36-A7 of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies.

During the pandemic, COVID-19-associated deaths were reportable to the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner (OCME) due to the ongoing Public Health Emergency. With the expiration of the federal public health emergency, OCME will transition COVID-19 death surveillance to DPH. COVID-19-associated deaths shall be a Category 2 condition and must be reported electronically or by fax within 12 hours. DPH will share the report with the local health department for the town where the case patient resides and will follow up with the provider as needed to collect additional information.

Thank you for your continued partnership in addressing the public health of the State of Connecticut.

Changes to Famers Market Food Vendor Licensing Requirements

State Adoption of the FDA Food Code

On February 17, 2023 the State of Connecticut adopted new food safety regulations. The new regulations replace the old Ct Public Health Code with the FDA Food Code Regulations (Section 19a-36h). As a result of these changes in the State of Connecticut food safety regulations there is a **new food vendor category that is now required to obtain a Farmers Market Food Vendors License prior to providing food products at a Farmers Market**. This new food vendor general category includes vendors that provide:

 Food or beverage that must be temperature controlled for safety during storage or display because they are potentially hazardous (requires refrigeration or freezing). While not a complete list, a few examples of past vendors that did not require a license, but now do under this new regulation include a butcher selling raw meat or seafood, a vendor that sells commercially prepackaged ice cream, a vendor that sells cheeses, or a vendor that sells cream or custard filled baked goods.

As always, vendors that conduct food preparation at the market, or offer ready to eat samples must continue to obtain a food license to serve food at the market.

Itinerant Food Vendor Licensing Reciprocity

In addition to changes to the food safety regulations outlined above, the Eastern Highlands Health District (EHHD) recently executed a *Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that establishes food licensing reciprocity for licensed Itinerant Food Vendors*, i.e. food trucks, and trailers. The execution of this MOU by the EHHD means food trucks that are already licensed by another *participating* local health department are not required to apply for, or pay for a food license with the EHHD. They are still, however, required to notify us ahead of their participation at the Farmers Market. Such notification can be made via our online permitting platform at https://easternhighlandshealthdistrict.viewpointcloud.com/. Furthermore, such vendors are still subject to a health inspection by the EHHD as part of the scheduled event. *This initiative only applies to self- contained mobile food trucks and trailers that obtain an annual operating license from another participating local health department.*



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

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

Area restaurants flagged by inspectors

Rodent feces, roach carcasses, unsanitary habits among issues

loach carcasses, flies, rodent droppings and cooks with unsanitary habits such as taste-testing sauce on a hand and scratching a scalp vithout handwashing were just a few of the problems found at Bloomfield restaurants by health inspectors for the West lartford/Bloomfield Health District.

The Courant obtained the public records through a Freedom of Information request that was fulfilled quickly and with a charge.

The records show at least eight restaurants/eateries in Bloomfield failed the inspection, but corrected the most serious violations by a renspection two weeks later or by a second re-inspection about a month later.

timee Krauss, director of the health district said the surprise inspections carry a "snapshot in time" and "we know people make nistakes."

'he purpose of the inspections, she said, is to keep the public and workers safe, as well as to educate restaurant owners on safe practices.

Trauss said that since the COVID-19 pandemic the employee turnover in restaurants has been high, so owners have to keep training.

rauss said there's an important collaborative and educational component to inspections, as inspectors work through problems with wners for as long as it takes.

That's an opportunity for restaurants to ask questions," she said. "Our goal is to protect the public's health," as well as that of mployees.

lone of the restaurants on the Bloomfield fail list were closed permanently, although some may have closed for a few days to correct roblems, Krauss said.

ecords show Bloomfield restaurants/eateries that failed inspection from August 2022 to February 2023 include:

saac's Bagel Cafe, 16 Mountain Ave., failed inspection on Oct. 17, 2022 with a score of 67 and two four-point violations, including hot and old holding temperatures.

he inspector detailed violations and noticeable elements in notes, including: flies throughout the kitchen; rodent droppings in a dry torage and back kitchen area; unclean walls throughout the kitchen; missing air thermometers; tomatoes not washed before being liced; coffee in coffee filters stored uncovered across from an ice machine; food stored on the floor of the walk-in cooler; fly control evices hung throughout the kitchen in food areas; melons stored on rack with cleaners and bleach across from a meat slicer; mold rowth on the interior of the ice machine.

hey were re-inspected again on Nov. 8, 2022 and failed with a 79, but passed on December 8, 2022 with a 97.

o one at the eatery could be reached for comment.

weet Delight Jamaican Cuisine, 715 Park Ave., failed inspection Dec. 6, 2022 with a score of 42. They had five four-point violations, 1cluding two for incorrect temperatures of food and one in a category that requires food to be "wholesome/ non-adulterated/safe."

he inspector's notes were extensive and included: a "cook used hand to lick sauce off of a hand to taste test;" "cook washed hands ithout soap after using his hand to lick sauce off of while taste testing;" rotten red peppers in the four-door reach-in cooler; a large pot f rice being held on the kitchen counter, which was ultimately voluntarily discarded; a pot of cod fish stored on a prep table; food ncovered in the reach-in cooler; bananas and ox tails stored on the floor of the kitchen. The inspector also noted several areas of ncleanliness.

weet Delight Jamaican Cuisine was re-inspected on Dec. 28 and failed with a 46. It included similar violations with a few added such as Evidence of roaches, including roach carcasses found in kitchen;" "white chicken and ox tails being store at room temp on the kitchen oor; non-food related items stored in food prep area, including perfume and medications.

he eatery passed inspection the next time, but the record was not available.

man who answered the phone at the restaurant, but would not identify himself said of the violations, "It's already addressed. We're ack on track."

'ah's Garden, 22 Mountain Road, failed the inspection Sept. 16, 2022, with a 43 and six four-point violations, including for toxic items nat must properly stored, labeled and used, and food temperatures. The inspector included numerous typed notes of detail, including nat a cook dropped raw shrimp on the floor, picked the shrimp up off the floor and threw it back into the pile of shrimp to be cooked. Le shrimp was later voluntarily discarded from the pile.

lso noted by the inspector was that the cook working shrimp did not wash his hands before he started working with food orders. The ook was also cleaning shrimp with bare hand contact, the notes state.

ther problems cited in the inspector's notes include: thermometer issues; raw eggs stored above mushrooms in walk-in cooler; raw eat stored above sauces in walk in cooler; boxes of chicken stored on the floor of the walk-in cooler; sauces stored on floor under prep

table; several unclean areas such as tops of prep tables; interior of rice cooker, interior of freezer; beef and fish thawing at room temperature in a three-bay sink flies in area of mop sink and grease trap.

Wah's Garden was re-inspected Oct. 3, 2022 and failed with an 86, including three four-point violations. Then it passed with a 96 on another re-inspection Oct. 17, 2022.

A person answering the phone at the restaurant declined comment.

Carbone's Kitchen, 6 Wintonbury Mall, failed inspection Dec. 22, 2022 with a score of 52, including four four-point violations that included incorrect temperatures and food cans not in good condition.

The inspector noted: severe black mold build up on walls in wash area; missing and broken thermometers; pastrami stored uncovered in the cooler across from dessert in cold holding unit; bare hand contact with food by cook preparing seafood; bare hand contact by cook putting cooked pasta into strainer to reheat; bare hand contact by server putting bread in the oven; back blade of deli slicer unclean; inside cabinets under deli slicer unclean. Carbone's was re-inspected on Jan. 31, 2023 and passed with a 85.

The owner could not be reached for comment.

Chosen 1 Cajun Seafood, 772 Park Ave., failed inspection Dec. 28, 2022 with a 68, including two four-point violations, one of them for coxic items being improperly stored, labeled or used.

The inspector's notes report a food worker rinsed hands in a prep sink with no soap and also over chicken thawing in water.

A food worker also did not wash hands "after scratching scalp and was going to attempt to prepare food," the inspector wrote.

The inspector's notes for Chosen 1 Seafood also state: No training documents for food workers; food containers on the floor of the walk in and dry storage area; wet, unclean cloths throughout the kitchen; no sanitizing buckets set up; toxic chemical stores next to lemon juice; nouthwash stored in ware washing area; dish soap stored in the floor next to onions and rice; unclean floor under equipment throughout citchen.

The eatery was re-inspected on Jan.19, 2023 and passed with a 90, but at that time the inspector added a few things to the list including: he presence of fruit flies in bar area; flour, seasonings exposed, uncovered.

The owner could not be reached for comment.

Thai Palace, 18 Wintonbury Mall, failed inspecttion on Dec. 21, 2022 with one four-point violation for hand wash facility issues.

There were few notes by the inspector, which included: No individual training records for employees; interior of reach-in cooler units inclean; raw chicken and pork stored over containers of sauces in walk-in

they subsequently passed re-inspection, but the record wasn't readily available.

hai palace owner Jackie Sisavath said she and her husband are new owners and without the knowledge of how things should be done, ook the guidance of the previous owners. Everything is now up to date, she said.

Jaatiya Indian Restaurant, 8 Mountain Ave. failed inspection Dec. 8, 2022 with a 69, including two four-point violations one of them elated to food temperature. There was no list of notes in the inspection received by the Courant.

'hey were re-inspected on Dec 28, 2022 and passed with a 92.

he manager could not be reached for comment.

ino's Pizza and Ranch House, 497 Cottage Grove Road failed inspection on August 8, 2022 with a score of 90 and one four-point violation hat was temperature related. There were just a few inspector's notes and one states, "small rodent feces under shelves in back room." he restaurant was re-inspected on Sept. 6, 2022 and passed with a 96 and no mention of rodent droppings.

he owner could not be reached for comment.
