Thursday, January 19, 2023

J. Elsesser called the meeting to order at 4:32 pm

Scheduled Item: EHHD Public Hearing – Proposed FY23/24 Operating Budget, & Proposed FY 23/24 CNR Budget.

- J. Elsesser opened the public hearing. R. Miller read the public notice into the record. (See attached). R. Miller noted that there were no written comments received. No public present.
- R. Miller reviewed clerical errors on page 5 of the budget, noting that they do not affect the proposed budget allocations. A corrected page 5 was provided.
- E. Anderson requested clarification that the CNR budget included the additional \$2000 added to the vehicle purchase line item. R. Miller confirmed.
- R. Miller reported that the Mansfield Finance Department notified the Health district that the medical insurance allocation has decreased \$4,640 for a total FY 23/24 allocation of \$135,460. This decrease is not reflected in the budget as presented.
- E. Anderson made a MOTION, seconded by M. Walter to close the Public Hearing at 4:40 pm. MOTION PASSED unanimously.

Minutes

E. Anderson made a MOTION, seconded by E. Wiecenski to accept the minutes of the December 8, 2022 meeting as presented. MOTION PASSED unanimously.

Proposed Fiscal Year 23/24 Operating Budget, & Proposed FY 23/24 CNR Budget

- R. Miller outlined options on how to amend the proposed budget, given the change in the medical insurance line item. R. Miller requested the board decide how to appropriate the \$4,640 savings in the insurance allocation.
- E. Anderson made a MOTION, seconded by E. Wiecenski to amend the proposed FY 23/24 budget to decrease the line item for health insurance by \$4,640 and a corresponding reduction in the per capita assessment to the towns. MOTION PASSED unanimously.
- E. Anderson made a MOTION, seconded by E. Wiecenski to adopt the FY 23/24 Operating and CNR budget as adjusted by the board. MOTION PASSED unanimously.

Town Reports

- **Willington** E. Wiecenski reported that there will be a referendum for the school building project on March 28, 2023.
- **Tolland** T. Nuccio informed the board that the town of Tolland has formed a Road Salt Task Force. In addition, a consultant has been hired to review the data from DEEP.
- **Mansfield** R. Aylesworth reported that a C.O. will be issued soon for the new Elementary School. The current plan is to open after the April break. In addition, the town is moving forward with the Facilities Needs Assessment.
- **Columbia** M. Walter reported that geese in Columbia continue to be a problem. A Goose Committee is working with DEEP to decrease the population of geese.
- M. Walter reported that they are in the final stages of qualification for an HVAC Air Filtration grant for the schools.

A bobcat is still on the loose in Columbia.

- **Andover** E. Anderson reported that DPW workers have attended Green Snow Pro training and the trucks have been calibrated for salt distribution. The town is currently using straight salt, reserving the use of treated salt for the colder times of the year.
- E. Anderson inquired whether the town of Coventry has tested the treated mulch. J. Elsesser informed the board that there is no product data sheet available for the product and therefore they have not tried it.
- E. Anderson reported that a builder has been selected for the building of the Community Center behind the town hall.
- E. Anderson informed the board that the town is part of the group "Hop River Trail Alliance."
- **Coventry** J. Elsesser that the project connecting the Nathan Hale to the Hop River Trail has been paused as the state wants an archeological study completed. An archeologist has been hired. J. Elsesser noted that the town worked with EHHD on the maintenance of the trail near Laidlaw Park.
- J. Elsesser informed the board that the town will be submitting a trail grant application to get from South Street to the Skungamaug to reclaim a fishing easement.
- J. Elsesser reported that the bonding for the HVAC in the High School project has passed. Work is planned for the summer.
- J. Elsesser noted that Bolton is asking the town of Manchester to amend the sewer maps as part of the project to extend sewers from Bolton down to Route 44.
- J. Elsesser reported a grant has been received to upgrade the sewer plant or extend it into the Windham plant.
- J. Elsesser informed the board that he will be meeting with 5 homeowners that have salt contamination issues. This meeting will begin the discussion of reviewing the alternatives to address the salt contamination.

J. Elsesser noted that the restaurant *Woke* has opened. In addition permitting has begun for the building that was previously Daisy or Reids.

Medical Advisor Dr. Dardick noted that flu and Covid-19 are still with us.

Directors Report

COVID-19 Activity Update

- R. Miller reported that influenza and RSV are trending down; COVID is trending up and hospitalizations are increasing. Tolland County is now at the "Orange"/High level. This is based on hospital beds being used, hospital admissions and the total number of new COVID cases in a specific geographical area. R. Miller noted that the prevalence of cases in the district has plateaued.
- J. Elsesser initiated discussion on increasing education on test & treat programs. R. Miller agreed that that message should be reinvigorated.
- R. Miller informed the board that free COVID test kits are being handed out at vaccination clinics and in the main office.
- R. Miller reported that iHealth test kit expiration dates have been extended again.

CADH Bill Tracking Report

- R. Miller informed the board that this item will be appearing on future meeting agendas.
- J. Elsesser initiated discussion on the EMS Omnibus bill. R. Miller will bring this to the Advocacy group.
- R. Miller noted that a report on the Cosmetology Program will be at the next meeting.

E. Anderson made a MOTION, seconded by M. Walter to adjourn the regular meeting at 5:33 pm. MOTION PASSED unanimously.

Audit Services - FY 2022/23

Article VII of the Bylaws requires that the District annually designate an independent public accounting firm to audit the books and accounts. This audit was performed last year by Blum Shapiro & Company, P.C. Services were bid out in 2016/17. A three year contract (with an option to extend for two years) was awarded to Blum Shapiro & Company, P.C. (now known as CliftonLarsonAllen LLP). However, due to the significant turnover in the Finance Department, along with the implementation of a new financial management system, the Town's Finance Committee has approved and CLA has agreed to a one year agreement for services for the FY 2022/23 audit. The fee for EHHD has increased to \$11,000 for the upcoming year. CLA has provided the following explanation for the increase:

"We have had to give significant salary increases to our staff in order to keep them as the industry is very competitive. In addition to all of the standards that have piled on over the years, with the Financial statements, various grant programs and EFS procedures. All three entities' fees have been pretty low over the past years."

The Eastern Highlands Health District Adopted 2023/24 Budget includes \$7,500 to cover the audit fee. The Board's approval is respectfully requested.

Cosmetology Permitting Program Implementation – Progress Report

Background

As you may recall, subsequent to a public hearing on June 16, 2022, the Board approved amendments to the EHHD Sanitary Code. These amendments established Section 5, Barbershop, Hairdressing, Cosmetology, Nail Salon and Spa provisions in the Sanitary Code. These new provisions require annual permitting, and establish sanitary inspection standards for such businesses within the Health District jurisdiction.

As part of the Health District implementation of this new regulatory program, by consensus of the Board, the Director was instructed to provide a progress report on the program implementation after 6 months; and if appropriate, recommend proposed adjustments to the Sanitary Code.

Program Implementation

On July 5, 2022 this office notified all known covered businesses of the steps needed to comply with this new sanitary code. The notification was sent via email and regular mail to approximately 40 known businesses at that time. The majority of the notified businesses responded in accordance with the initial notification. Individual telephone calls, and/or site visits by field staff were utilized to address delayed responses. Generally, this phase of the implementation process progressed as planned.

As of March 23, 2023, the number of identified businesses has grown to 84. This increase is due in large part to new businesses identified during the course of the program implementation. Over half, or 45 of these businesses are individual independent contractors that lease a chair/workstation within a brick and mortar salon business establishment. Of the 84 covered businesses (or independent contractors) identified, 75 of them have completed the permit application and inspection process in full compliance with the new sanitary code.

As of the date of this memorandum, two (2) businesses are not yet in full compliance subsequent to their first inspection, and nine (9) still must complete their first inspection. Further details can be found in the attached document titled, Cosmetology Report Summary, March 23, 2023.



Discussion

Thirteen (13) of the businesses listed in the attached summary report required changes to plumbing to come into compliance. These changes have been successfully completed. (They needed to add a dedicated hand wash station). Additionally, based on current state regulations two businesses must employ DPH licensed individuals to gain compliance, and currently do not. Because this is a new program and such businesses have been operating for some time under existing conditions, we engaged the out of compliance businesses in a process to establish a mutually agreeable timeline for compliance. We anticipate that all of the above referenced businesses currently out of compliance will come into compliance with the new sanitary code within a reasonable time period.

The number of identified covered businesses has increased significantly since the development of the original roster of identified businesses was developed. This has contributed to the extended number of weeks needed to complete the implementation period. Despite this, and with few exceptions, the process has been reasonably well received by businesses owners and contractors. Because these types of services lend themselves well to discrete in-home businesses, I anticipate that we will continue to occasionally identify new covered businesses in the weeks or months to come. Once identified, we notify such a businesses of the new regulations, and work with them on a mutually agreeable timeline for compliance.

Based on experience and progress to date with the implementation of this new program, we are not seeing a pattern that warrants proposed changes to the new sanitary code at this time. This office will revisit this matter, again, at such time new information comes to the fore that warrants a new review.

Departments and Districts

On December 1, 2022, the Connecticut Department of Public Health (CT DPH) was awarded a 5-year grant totaling \$30,284,691 by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) under Component A1 – Workforce of its <u>Public Health Infrastructure Grant Program</u>. CDC has directed recipient states to distribute 40% of these funds within the first grant year to local health jurisdictions based both on the population served by these jurisdictions and some measure of health equity in the communities they serve (in this case, percentage of the population living below the poverty line).

A total of \$12,113,876 will be distributed to Connecticut's 61 part-time, full-time, and district local health jurisdictions. As indicated in the CDC grant announcement, the intended use of funding through Component A1 — Workforce is to allow recipients to "... fill vacancies and create new positions, and they can retain staff who are on term appointments, whom they wish to extend employment. Recipients can also make significant new investments in workforce engagement, well-being, and other related programs and services, to assist with retention and help improve emotional, mental, and physical health outcomes of the workforce. New and existing staff always need training, whether to refresh skills and knowledge or to learn new skills, given a dynamic public health work environment. Under this strategy, recipients can expand and strengthen training programs across focus or topic areas, intended audiences, methodologies, and formats. All trainings should strive to adhere to CDC's Quality Training Standards and, when appropriate, to be made available through CDC TRAIN."

Funding amounts for each jurisdiction can be found in the table on the following pages. Funds to local health jurisdictions will be distributed in the first funding year (by 11/30/2023) and can be allocated for use by the jurisdiction through the end of the grant period (11/30/2027).

Although individual jurisdictions can utilize these funds as they see fit within the CDC-defined *Component A1 – Workforce* activities to maximize their impact within the populations they serve, funds must still be utilized in compliance with both general Federal guidelines (2 CFR 200 Subpart E) and Health and Human Services guidelines (45 CFR part 75) for allowable and unallowable expenses for Federal grant funds. Throughout the 5-year project period during which these funds can be allocated, CT DPH will be collecting information from recipient local health departments to include in our grant progress reporting to CDC, and to our federal, state and local partners regarding the statewide activities related to public health workforce and infrastructure development. This information will also help to inform the CT DPH Office of Public Health Workforce Development on our progress toward meeting the goals identified within our 5-year project plan. The form, manner, and anticipated timing of funding distributions to, and information collection from, local health departments with be forthcoming.

The funds can be used to support routine vaccinations, influenza, and COVID-19 vaccinations.

Funds will be available for use by local health departments (LHDs) until June 30, 2025. This notice is intended to assist you in budget planning for your department. You will receive a separate notification of award in order to begin the contracting process.

Please note this funding will be allocated subject to Local Health entering into a contract with DPH. We have attached a list of approved activities, allowable/unallowable expenses and requirements as condition of funding for your review in order to determine whether you would like to accept this funding.

For those LHDs offered Vaccine Equity Partnership Funding (VEPF) funding, in order to receive the allocated VEPF funds, you must agree to complete and submit a Rapid Community Assessment (RCA) during the term of this contract.

IMMUNIZATION AND VACCINES FOR CHILDREN COVID-19 SUPPLEMENTS AND MEDIA FUNDING

SUPPORTED ACTIVITIES

1. Enhance Vaccination Capacity. Such activities include but are not limited to:

- a. Hire staff for vaccination clinic administration and support.
- b. Purchase medical and clerical supplies for vaccination clinics.
- c. Rent space or tents for vaccination clinics.
- d. Rent or lease vehicle(s).

2. Increase vaccination and outreach efforts. Such activities include but are not limited to:

- a. Conduct an RCA (for those LHDs receiving VEPF funding).
- b. Work with community partners to coordinate and promote vaccination sites identified through the RCA.
- c. Support vaccination partners with information and coordination in the community to identify and vaccinate at-risk populations identified by the RCA.

3. Based on the RCA, identify, coordinate, and engage with partners to respond to and prevent vaccine preventable disease outbreaks including COVID-19 and influenza. Such activities include but are not limited to:

- a. Identify essential partners to address community needs based on the RCA.
- b. Build essential partnerships with federally qualified health centers, faith-based organizations, community-based partners, universities, and other congregate healthcare settings within the region (collectively "community partners") to build trust, ensure education and vaccination of community members and minimize the spread of vaccine preventable communicable diseases.
- c. Coordinate and engage with community partners to encourage and support vaccination of vulnerable populations. Activities should work in conjunction with the work of other Covid Action Plans (CAPs) but not supplant them.
- d. Work with community partners to coordinate and promote vaccinations sites in the Contractor's Region.

4. Media outreach. Such activities include but are not limited to:

- a. Use Health and Human Services (HHS) and CDC provided message guidance, resources, and research to implement activities in line with the vaccine confidence strategy with a focus on the "movable middle." Use "We Can Do This" campaign visual identity and assets.
- b. Use DPH Communications Department developed media.
- c. Hire a media company to develop advertising to reach the communities defined by the RCA.
- d. Hire a social media company or staff to conduct a social media campaign.

MEDIA INFORMATION

When issuing health communication materials including statements, press releases, publications, requests for proposal, bid solicitations, and other documents (such as toolkits, resource guides, websites, and presentations describing the projects or programs funded in whole or in part with HHS funds), the LHD must acknowledge federal funding per HHS requirements.

ALLOWABLE EXPENSES

Expenses allowed under this funding include but are not limited to:

- 1. Software associated with vaccine registries or tracking of vaccines and vaccine registry enhancements.
- 2. Expenses associated with outreach and assistance such as support provided through community partners for at risk populations.
- 3. Health communication material and health education services to inform and protect communities including culturally linguistic materials. **NOTE**: HHS has statutory requirements to acknowledge the funding source when issuing statements, press releases, publications, requests for proposal bid solicitation, etc.
- 4. Support for social services and health education to promote vaccination activities.
- 5. Staff for immunization clinics including nurses, vaccine registry data managers, health educators, health communicators, management, budget and administrative support and security staff.
- 6. Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for vaccinators (stockpiling not allowable).
- 7. Vaccination clinic supplies.
- 8. Costs associated with off-site vaccine clinics (e.g., contractual personnel, mileage, coolers).
- 9. Costs associated with vaccination messaging and media including translation services.

UNALLOWABLE EXPENSES

Immunization COVID-19 funds cannot be expended for:

- 1. Vaccine purchase.
- 2. Research.
- 3. Clinical care.
- 4. Food or restaurant gift cards (grocery store gift cards are allowed with prior written approval from the CDC and the Department).
- 5. Incentives for anyone except the newly vaccinated and only with prior written approval from the CDC and the Department.
- 6. Purchase of vehicles.
- 7. Vaccination supplies provided in ancillary kits.
- 8. Billing software.
- 9. Costs associated with disposal of medical waste.
- 10. Any cost previously or currently covered by other federal funding.

REQUIREMENTS AS CONDITION OF FUNDING

- 1. Submit a completed budget, budget justification and work plan to DPH.
- 2. If receiving VEPF funds, conduct an RCA in accordance with the terms of the final agreement with the Department and submit to Laura.Leblanc@ct.gov.

- 3. Submit copies of all media produced during quarterly programmatic reporting. All media created must contain the HHS required funding acknowledgement statement.
- 4. Utilize funding to support vaccination efforts by arranging for and promoting non-traditional sites for vaccinating individuals, including vulnerable populations in accordance with the results of the RCA (if applicable).
- 5. Submit monthly financial and quarterly programmatic and metric reports as determined by DPH that correspond with activities outlined in the DPH-approved work plan and budget.

In addition to the aforementioned requirements, the use of the funds shall be subject to the terms and conditions to be incorporated in the contract between the LHD and DPH.

Activity Report January 1, 2023 – March 31, 2023

Highlighted Accomplishments/Activities

- Working with Board of Directors, adopted the Fiscal Year 2023/2024 Operating Budget and Capital Nonrecurring Budget during their January 19th meeting. The operations side includes a total of \$976,547 in spending authorization.
- Initiated and largely completed the annual operating license renewal process for approximately 240 food service establishments.
- The agency continues is efforts to prevent COVID-19. See the separate report attached on COVID-19 response activities for the latest COVID statistical report, and surveillance report.
- The implementation of the new cosmetology program consisting of initial site inspections and approval the first round of business operating permits is largely complete. Process has gone generally as planned. A progress report under separate cover will be presented at next board meeting.
- The new FDA Food Code became effective on February 17, 2023. During this reporting period staff has engaged in a number of implementation activities. These include participating in weekly virtual Q&A sessions with the DPH food protection program; establishing interim system for record keeping and inspection tracking; staff training on new inspection form; developing interim enforcement protocols; and, notifying and communicating with owners/operators. Implementation activities remain ongoing.
- As authorized by the Board, the state-wide Itinerant Food Vendor (IFV) Memorandum of Understanding establishing license reciprocity was executed in March by the Director.
 The execution of this MOU permits IFV's to travel to participating jurisdictions without additional local permitting and fees.
- The Director's office is working with Town of Mansfield staff to support the new elementary school project. This includes not only typical site construction oversight, but also ongoing support in responding to concerns of drinking water quality at the school.
- We continue to support the Town of Tolland & Coventry's effort to address sodium and chloride contamination in private water supply well.



- This office attended and participated as active member of the UConn Institutional Biosafety Committee, community member at-large.
- This office continues to support and participate in monthly Mansfield "Town/Gown" meeting with UConn.
- This office continues to support and participate in UConn Infectious control and prevention committee
- Community Health and Wellness Programs: See separate CHWC quarterly report
 attached for more details. Selected highlights include implementation seasonal flu
 vaccine program, radon program, lead case management, TB case management, Chronic
 Disease Prevention (Block Grant) activities, opioid misuse prevention activities, and
 other outreach initiatives.
- Emergency Preparedness Program: Highlighted EP activities for this period include ordering 1500 Preparedness Guides, coordination of seasonal flu clinics, and planning and preparation for upcoming Medical Counter Measures Training event. (See separate EHHD PHPP report attached.)

Plans for the Next Quarter

- Implementation of newly adopted FDA Food Code includes many ongoing activities. These include staff training, business orientation and education, and adjustments to operational procedures.
- Recruit and hire new Sanitarian II.
- Develop, draft, and submit to DPH a grant proposal for the Preventive Health Block Grant.
- Develop and implement internal protocols to respond to expanded Childhood lead protections regulations.
- Develop spending and work plans for workforce development and immunizations grants.
- Adjust and modify COVID-19 activities to align with Federal and State changes to prevention programs.
- Initiate annual bathing water monitoring program.





- Progress on activities to establish a 3rd party billing program for the agency.


Quarterly Report January 1, 2023 - March 31, 2023 Year to Date Historgrams with 5 Year Trend Comparisons for Selected Activity Indicators


Deep Test Holes






Septic Permits Issued








Emergency Preparedness/Response

CHWC continues to provide information to the MRC volunteers and on-boarded new volunteers via the CTResponds system. In total, in this reporting period there are 173 volunteers. CHWC sends emails to MRC volunteers to staff the upcoming clinics and then assigns the volunteers to the clinics. CHWC submits the MRC activation paperwork for the MRC and follows up with the final rosters. CHWC continues to attend Region 4 MRC mass vaccination and MRC planning meetings units and to maintain the National MRC activity log.

01/09/2023 CHWC organized an evening of Basic Life Saving, 10 people participated. CHWC organized a virtual MRC meeting 15 people attended. 03/30/2023 CHWC organized a Stop the Bleed training, 8 people attended; some of these people will go on to be instructors.

CHWC provided telephone support to residents and stakeholders about COVID-19, including schools. CHWC continues to support contact tracing for COVID-19 cases. CHWC also provides important information to the Covid-19 Project Staffer to circulate on social media and on EHHD bulletin boards.

CHWC trains clinic staff and supervises clinical operations. EHHD performs biweekly vaccination clinics in Mansfield. During this quarter, there were 3 pop-up clinics: Bolton Library, Coventry Winter Farmer's market, and Scotland Elementary School. The homebound patients also received Covid-19 boosters. The total number of doses administered during this quarter was 104 Covid-19.

Employee Wellness Programs

Activities to meet contract deliverables for the current employer groups (Town of Tolland) continue as planned.

Tolland

Currently there are 14 people registered for the Tolland Be Well Program. The CHWC coordinated the Quarterly Educational Event, on 03/22/2023 for the Tolland Town employees, **Gardening for Health.**12 people attended in person and an online version was posted to the Be Well website for people unable to attend. On 03/29/2023 CHWC and Chris Grulke conducted a Biometric Screening event;12 people attended.

Preventive Health Block Grant

The CHWC sent out the Spring Quarterly Buzz March 2nd. Working with Ande Bloom to reach out to Recreation Directors and Libraries to find projects that support the Active Living Philosophy that is the part of the grant and EHHD's plans. CHWC worked with Columbia to deliver paddleboards as part of the Block Grant. CHWC worked with Bolton to order kayaks as part of the Block grant.

CHWC and Ande Bloom are currently working with Bike Mansfield and Mansfield Elementary School administrators on the Safe Routes to School and a Bike Safety Program. During this quarter, CHWC attended 2 meetings with Bike Mansfield and a meeting of the Park and Recreation Planning for the Town of Mansfield where there was a discussion of a proposed plan by Bike Mansfield on the adoption of policies and plans to improve trails and pathways for biking. CHWC spoke at the meeting to support the adoption, as it was part of ways for which people could be more active.

Community Outreach

CHWC provided information to individuals and stakeholders regarding COVID-19 in phone calls and emails. CHWC participated in 1 meeting of the Coventry Safety and Wellness Committee.





Activity Report October 1, 2022 – December 31, 2022

Highlighted Accomplishments/Activities

- The agency continues is efforts to prevent COVID. See the separate report attached on COVID-19 response activities for the latest COVID statistical report, and surveillance report.
- We continue to progress on the implementation of the recently adopted Section 5 of the EHHD
 Sanitary Code, Barbershop, Hairdressing, Cosmetology, Nail Salon and Spa. Forty-four site
 inspections have been conducted as of 12/31. Will be reporting our details to the board during the
 next regular board meeting.
- Staff continues working with Town of Mansfield staff to support the new elementary school project. This includes not only typical site construction oversight, but also support in responding to concerns of well water quality at the school.
- We continue to support the Town of Tolland & Coventry's effort to address sodium and chloride contamination in private water supply well. This office participated in a neighbor forum for C
- Partnered and supported NCDHD \$300,000 NACCHO grant proposal to implement opioid overdose prevention services at the local level. The grant was awarded in this quarter We attended our first partnership meeting in December.
- This office researched, developed, and distributed guidance to all membership towns recommending spending options for opioid settlement funds.
- This office attended and participated as active member of the UConn Institutional Bio-safety Committee, community member at-large.
- Assisted Town of Tolland staff with research and background on old landfill site, and initial starting points for proposed solar project at the site.
- Ongoing support provided to the Town of Willington regarding a chronic property maintenance complaint on Old Farms Road.
- This office continues to support and participate in monthly Mansfield "Town/Gown" meeting with UConn.






Deep Test Holes








CHWC completed the annual CVP reenrollment application in November. Application was due December 2022.	CHWC will continue to maintain and update the vaccine program and will attend the Immunization Coalition meetings. CHWC will participate in regional meetings to coordinate mass vaccination. CHWC will continue to coordinate COVID-19 vaccination.

Emergency Preparedness/Response

CHWC continues to provide information to the MRC volunteers and on-boarded new volunteers via the CTResponds system. In total, in this reporting period there are 180 volunteers. CHWC provided telephone support to residents and stakeholders about COVID-19, including schools. CHWC continues to support contact tracing for COVID-19 cases. CHWC also provides important information to the Covid-19 Project Staffer to circulate on social media and on EHHD bulletin boards.

CHWC trains clinic staff and supervises clinical operations. EHHD performs biweekly vaccination clinics in Mansfield. During this quarter, there were 9 pop-up clinics: Bolton Library x 2, Ashford Library, Coventry Fire Department, Tolland Fire Department, Chaplin Fire Department, Columbia Fire Department, Coventry Winter Farmer's market, and Mansfield town hall flu clinic. The homebound patients also received Covid-19 boosters and flu shots. The total number of doses administered during this quarter was 323 Covid-19 and 163 flu shots. CHWC sends emails to MRC volunteers to staff the upcoming clinics and then assigns the volunteers to the clinics. CHWC submits the MRC activation paperwork for the MRC and follows up with the final rosters. CHWC keeps standing orders updated with the Medical Director.

CHWC continues to attend Region 4 MRC mass vaccination and MRC planning meetings units and to maintain the National MRC activity log.

CHWC conducted a meeting for the Medical Reserve Corps on 11/01/22. The Sexual Assault Crisis service and Human Trafficking Prevention Programs provided training. 8 people attended.

Employee Wellness Programs

Activities to meet contract deliverables for the current employer groups (Town of Tolland) continue as planned.

Tolland

Currently there are 14 people registered for the Tolland Be Well Program. The CHWC coordinated the Quarterly Educational Event, on 12/07/2023 for the Tolland Town employees, Question Persuade and Refer: Suicide Training. 13 people attended in person and an online version was posted to the Be Well website for people unable to attend. CHWC conducted a Vegetable and Fruit Challenge in December. CHWC provided a weekly tips and recipe page. 12 people signed up, 7 people qualified for the drawing.

Preventive Health Block Grant

CHWC attended 2 Bike Mansfield Meetings and assisted with collecting data and filling out the Town of Mansfield's Bike Friendly application with the League of American Bicyclists. The CHWC sent out the Winter Quarterly Buzz December 1st. Working with Ande Bloom to reach out to Recreation Directors and Libraries to find projects that support the Active Living Philosophy that is the part of the grant and EHHD's plans. CHWC and Ande Bloom ae currently working with Bike Mansfield and Mansfield Elementary School administrators on the Safe Routes to School and a Bike Safety Program. During this quarter, CHWC attended a meeting with Bike Mansfield and the Mansfield Schools Superintendent to further the adoption of the Bike Safety Course for 4th graders in Mansfield.

Community Outreach

CHWC provided information to individuals and stakeholders regarding COVID-19 in phone calls and emails. CHWC participated in 1 meetings of the UCONN Bike Friendly University meetings. CHWC participated in 1 meeting of the Coventry Safety and Wellness Committee.





FROM THE WINY RADIO NEWSROOM: (KILLINGLY) The Town of Killingly has begun considering whether it may want to leave the Northeast District Department of Health (NDDH), with statements made by Town Manager Mary Calorio at this week's Town Council meeting indicating that other towns are exploring what their alternatives are as well.

Calorio explained to the Council how at the most recent Northeastern Connecticut Council of Governments (NECCOG) meeting, NDDH presented an estimated increase in what it charges towns of \$3.75 per capita – a 50% increase from \$7.50 to \$11.25, which Calorio says would represent an extra \$66,000 for the Town of Killingly. Since then, however, Calorio says NDDH has informed her that this proposal is down to about a \$2.50 increase, and could possibly be lowered further from there.

That being said, discussions continued about the possibility of Killingly ending its relationship with NDDH. Because a January 1st deadline has already passed, it would be too late for Killingly to leave NDDH for this upcoming budget, but with a deadline of January 1st of 2024 the Council could explore options to potentially find or establish another health service for the following fiscal year. Calorio named Eastern Highlands Health District in Mansfield and Ledge Light Health District in New London as potential alternatives to the local NDDH in Brooklyn.

Calorio said there are plans for NDDH Director Sue Starkey to give the Council a presentation at its March meeting regarding the increases proposed in the health district's budget.

"I will say at the NECCOG meeting it was very abbreviated as to what the explanation was. It was essentially wages and inflation, and that was I think pretty much all we were told. There were really no details provided." Calorio said. "One thing I had asked at the NECCOG meeting was if the payroll included an expansion of service. She did finally indicate that it appears that they were going to be hiring one additional position, but I don't know to what extent that increase in salary costs them or what that impact is to the per capita."

There were other concerns raised about NDDH at the Council meeting too. Councilor Ed Grandelski said he has been receiving complaints that restaurant inspections aren't being done in a timely manner.

Attempts by WINY to get a comment from NDDH for this report were not immediately successful.

Dear Member Town CEO – I want to update you on a matter that may come to your attention in the coming weeks. Please see the attached letter sent to all licensed food establishment within the Health District.

By way of background, in 2017 and 2018 the CGA adopted state statutes that authorized and began a process to transition Connecticut away from the old Connecticut Public Health Code food safety regulations towards applying and implementing the FDA Food Code regulations. Leading up to and during the above reference years the Connecticut Directors of Health Association was working in cooperation with the CT DPH Food Protection Program on the many program area changes that would be needed to effectively and efficiently implement these new regulations at the local and state level. This included but was not limited to retraining and recertifying field inspectors, developing new internal protocols for operations and enforcement, procuring new or modifying existing software systems to track local health department food safety program activities, and implementing a communication and orientation campaign to assist food establishments with this transition. Despite the fact that the enabling statutes were adopted, in 2019 local health department's notified that the review of the regulations were delayed with no timeline for approval. Consequently, all preparedness activities were paused. On 2/9/23 we were informed that the Regulation Review Committee process is progressing, and that the regulations will be in full force and effect on 2/17/23.

The FDA Food Code is easier to understand, science and risk based, and an improvement upon the old CT food safety regulations. These regulations will be more protective of public health. However, this short notice provided by the state has left all local health departments in the State of Connecticut scrambling to implement and enforce these new regulations. Despite the fact that these regulations are currently in effect, it will take some time to get staff and food establishment operators fully up to speed on the new inspection form, procure a software system to properly track our food program activities (the current one is now obsolete), finalize fair and equitable agency enforcement protocols, and amend our existing EHHD Sanitary Code to align with the new regulations.

Because the regulations are in effect, the Health District's current priority is to use the new inspection form for all inspections moving forward. The new inspection form does contain a number of new codes that will be surprise to many food establishment owners and operators. On the positive side, however, this same inspection form provides for more inspector discretion on follow up and enforcement. Our inspectors will spend the additional time needed in the field to provide on the spot education. We are also planning an educational and informational forum for owners and operators in the coming weeks. Our agency will endeavor to work together with our owners and operators during this transition.

Re: IMPORTANT FDA FOOD CODE UPDATE

Dear Food Establishment Operator/Owner-

You may recall that the implementation the new FDA Food Code started phasing in during 2017. The State of Connecticut has finally approved a series of new regulations officially placing in to effect the full FDA Model Food Code — 2022. These regulations replace the old Connecticut Public Health Code food safety sections.

The purpose of this letter is to recap selected changes in the laws that have gone into effect thus far, update you on where the new regulations currently stand, and what this means for you and your food service establishment.

Below is the timeline of those salient changes over the past years:

- Cold holding temperatures decreased from 45 degrees Fahrenheit or below to 41 degrees
 Fahrenheit or below, effective 2017.
- Hot holding temperatures changed from a minimum of 140 degrees Fahrenheit to a minimum of 135 degrees Fahrenheit, effective 2017.
- The class definitions for a food establishment changed, effective 2017. This resulted in a classification change for some establishments, but not all. Those licensed establishments have since been notified.
- Qualified Food Operators (QFOs) became known as the Certified Food Protection Managers (CFPM), and CFPM are required to have current certification, effective 2018.
- ALL food establishments will be required to register with the Connecticut Department of Public
 Health before a licensed is issued, or renewed by the EHHD, effective 2018. (Because the CT
 DPH has not yet set up registration system, this requirement is on pause. We will notify you when
 more information becomes available.)

Effective February 17, 2023 selected highlighted new requirements include (this is not exhaustive list):

 A Certified Food Protection Manager (CFPM), with a current certification shall be onsite during peak hours of operation. A list of approved CFPM testing organizations can be found here: https://portal.ct.gov/-/media/Departments-and-Agencies/DPH/dph/FoodProtection/testing-orgs-updated-1-12-23.pdf

- Refrigerated food products will require date labeling.
- All hand sinks will be required to have a poster for food employee's to wash their hands.
- The new inspection report does not provide a "pass or fail" number score. Violations cited during inspections will be categorized as "Priority", "Priority Foundation", and "Core" that align with the risk of foodborne illness associated with that violation. You will be provided a specific time period in which a cited violation shall be corrected, and subject to re-inspection or verification. The time periods for compliance will also vary pending the risk.

The Eastern Highlands Health District realizes that this will be a transition for you and for us as we work to implement these new regulations. We understand that changes like this can generate questions. *In an effort to address these questions the Health District will be scheduling a hybrid meeting for food establishment owners and operators.* At that meeting we will be presenting the main changes in the code, inspection form, and providing an opportunity for questions and answers. More information on this is forthcoming.

In the meantime we encourage you to work with your EHHD inspector as they conduct their inspections using the new inspection form, effective immediately. Our inspectors will be spending extra time in the field explaining the new inspection process to you, and will be glad to answer any additional questions at that time. 

Dear Providers:

Last year, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) lowered the blood lead reference value to 3.5µg/dL and encouraged partners to also act. This reference value is used to identify children with blood lead levels that are higher than most children's levels. Children with blood lead levels at or above the reference value are among the top 2.5% of U.S. children with the highest blood lead levels. On August 5, 2022, Public Act 22-49 was signed into law, updating the lead poisoning prevention standards in Connecticut.

Public Act 22-49 lowers the lead in blood reference value in Connecticut from 5µg/dL to 3.5µg/dL. Blood lead re-testing requirements and timelines are based on this new value and **took effect on January 1, 2023**. The Connecticut Department of Public Health (DPH) has updated their guidance document entitled *Requirements and Guidance for Childhood Lead Screening by Health Care Professionals in Connecticut* (attached). Major revisions of the requirements and guidelines include:

- lowering the blood lead level for retesting from 5μg/dL to 3.5μg/dL;
- · updating testing, re-testing, and reporting timelines; and
- streamlining clinical support resources.

The Connecticut DPH seeks your assistance with:

- reminding parents that blood lead testing is required annually for all children between 9 and 35 months:
- ensuring medical re-testing and reporting according to established timelines; and
- providing lead poisoning prevention educational information during well child visits.

Collaboration is paramount in our efforts to reduce and eliminate childhood lead poisoning in Connecticut. Thank you for partnering with us to ensure healthy futures for our children.

The purpose of this letter is to request continued collaboration on follow-up interviews of foodborne/enteric disease cases, which will reduce duplication of efforts, and to provide an update on preliminary 2020/2021/2022 foodborne disease data.

This is the 28th year that Connecticut has participated in the Foodborne Diseases Active Surveillance Network (FoodNet), the principle foodborne disease component of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Emerging Infections Program. It is also the 12th year that Connecticut will participate in the Foodborne Diseases Centers for Outbreak Response Enhancement (FoodCORE), through which all participating centers work toward developing better methods to detect, investigate, respond to, and control local and multistate foodborne outbreaks. Additional information about these programs can be found at: www.cdc.gov/foodcore/.

In 2023, FoodNet/FoodCORE staff will continue to interview all cases of cyclosporiasis, Enterotoxigenic *E. coli* (ETEC), *E. coli* O157 and non-O157 Shiga toxin-producing *E. coli* (STEC) infection, listeriosis, salmonellosis, shigellosis and vibriosis. Selected campylobacteriosis (those cases reported by Quest Diagnostics), as part of a FoodNet project focusing on antibiotic resistant foodborne/enteric infections, will be targeted for interview by FoodNet/FoodCORE staff and indicated as such in the "Notes" field of the CT Electronic Disease Surveillance System (CTEDSS). interview conducted by FoodNet/FoodCORE will be entered or attached to the patient's record in CTEDSS. When an ill person who works in a high-risk occupation (i.e. food handler, health-care worker, daycare attendee/staff) is identified, the relevant local health department(s) will be notified.

Local health departments (LHDs) should continue to conduct interviews on all other foodborne/enteric disease cases. These include cases of campylobacteriosis not reported by Quest, and yersiniosis using the appropriate pathogen-specific "General Enteric Diseases Interview Form" (GEDIF) (attached). Completed GEDIF information should be entered directly into CTEDSS using the GEDIF Wizard.

Please share these documents with your staff responsible for foodborne disease surveillance and follow-up. EPA Draft Rule for Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS)

On March 14, 2023, the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) <u>announced</u> a draft National Primary Drinking Water Rule (NPDWR) for per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) in public drinking water that includes draft Maximum Contaminant Levels (MCL) for six (6) PFAS. The release of the draft rule in the Federal Register initiates a 60-day review and comment period. DPH looks forward to reviewing the draft rule and EPA's finalization of enforceable standards for PFAS in public drinking water.

On June 15, 2022, the Connecticut Department of Public Health (DPH) <u>updated its health-protective</u> <u>guidance values</u>, also known as Action Levels, for four (4) of the PFAS that EPA proposes to regulate. The DPH welcomes EPA's announcement as we continue to strive for the most protective health-based standards for PFAS that reflect the evolving scientific evidence on their toxicity.

Draft MCLs for PFAS per EPA's proposed rule and current DPH guidelines are:

Law (BIL) - CALL FOR PROJECTS for State Fiscal Year 2024

The Department of Public Health's (DPH) Drinking Water Section (DWS) is announcing its call for eligible drinking water projects for potential funding through the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) during State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2024. The DWSRF will be receiving substantial levels of federal funding support for drinking water infrastructure projects during SFY 2024 through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL). The BIL will provide the DPH with 3 additional DWSRF grants annually through SFY 2027. A brief description of these grants is provided below:

- 1. Supplemental Capitalization Grant: These funds can be used for any drinking water infrastructure project that is currently eligible for DWSRF funding including planning, design and construction phases.
- 2. Lead Service Line Replacement (LSLR) Grant: These funds can only be used for LSLR projects and the funding is available for both the utility-owned and privately-owed portion of these service lines (i.e. the entire service line from main to customer premise). It will be necessary to replace each LSLR in its entirety to be eligible to receive these funds.
- 3. Emerging Contaminants Grant: These funds can be used for the remediation of emerging contaminants which a focus on Per-and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS) and Perfluorooctanoic Acid (PFOA).

Applications will be reviewed and assigned appropriate priority points according to the <u>DWSRF Draft Priority Ranking System</u> (PRS).

This Draft PRS is also in the February 16, 2023 Draft SFY 2023 IUP which is currently available for a 30-day public review and comment period. Comments on the Draft IUP or PRS may be submitted to DPH.CTDWSRF@ct.gov until noon on March 28, 2023. Please refer to the DWSRF website for more information.

New Draft Intended Use Plan and Project Priority List

The Connecticut Department of Public Health's (DPH) Drinking Water Section (DWS) is presenting a new draft Intended Use Plan (IUP) for State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2023 for the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF). The October 18, 2022 Draft SFY 2023 IUP was published for public review and comment, with a public hearing held on November 22, 2022. This original draft IUP included the use of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Social Vulnerability Index (SVI) in the Priority Ranking System (Attachment B) and for the determination of whether a project was qualified for the Disadvantaged Community Assistance Program (DCAP) (Attachment K).

DPH had reviewed its DWSRF program's disadvantaged community definition as recommended by the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) implementation memo dated March 8, 2022 in an effort to ensure that BIL funds were helping people most in need. Draft IUP versions incorporating SVI were shared with EPA in August and September 2022; EPA raised no concerns regarding use of SVI within their reviews. However, during the formal comment period for the October 18, 2022 Draft SFY 2023 IUP, the EPA provided comments which stated a concern that "any "disadvantaged community" definition that incorporates race as a metric is open to possible litigation as a violation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964" (Title VI). EPA recommended that both the new priority ranking system and disadvantaged community definition be discussed with state legal counsel for their opinion on these definitions and its compliance with Title VI. The SVI does include "racial and ethnic minority status" as one of 4 themes in their scoring system. DPH notes that three additional SVI metrics, "age", "disability" and "language," may raise similar concerns with respect to compliance with other federal anti-discrimination laws.

This new draft SFY 2023 IUP will incorporate a PRS very similar to that which has been used by the DWSRF program for several years and was in the SFY 2022 IUP, with minor changes to incorporate the new funding from the BIL. The DCAP in the new draft SFY 2023 IUP will incorporate, in lieu of SVI, the use of median household income information from the American Community Survey along with the Connecticut Department of Economic and Community Development's (DECD) "distressed municipality" list, the latter of which has been used since incorporation of the formal DCAP program. DPH believes these DCAP criterion align closely with the elements of SVI but do not raise concerns under Title VI or other anti-discrimination laws. DPH believes the DECD criteria are also appropriate in determining whether a project meets affordability criteria established by the DCAP.

Due to the significance of the changes necessitated by EPA's testimony, DPH believes it is appropriate to provide additional opportunity for public comment on these changes. As a result, the DPH will publish a revised February 16, 2023 Draft SFY 2023 IUP for a 30-day public comment period followed by another public hearing. A final SFY 2023 IUP will be prepared following this second public hearing and after consideration of any additional testimony received. Please refer to the Hearing Report for the November 22, 2022 Public Hearing and the February 16, 2023 Draft SFY 2023 IUP for more information. Detailed information about the PRS and DCAP is included in this new draft SFY 2023 IUP.

A remote public hearing on the February 16, 2023 Draft SFY 2023 IUP has been scheduled for March 29, 2023 to provide an opportunity for meaningful comments. The February 16, 2023 Draft SFY 2023 IUP, information on this hearing, and a link for registration can be found on the <u>DWSRF website</u>. A hearing notice will also be published in various local newspapers across the state and posted on the <u>DWSRF website</u>.

Comments will be accepted until noon on March 28, 2023. Comments in writing may be submitted electronically via email to dph.ctdwsrf@ct.gov. Please note "DWSRF Public Hearing" in the subject line. Oral testimony will be accepted during the public hearing.



Bridge Structures Experiencing Sudden Release of Lead-Based Paint Chips

Release Date: 02/17/23

Bridge structures state-wide have been experiencing a sudden, unexpected release of lead-based paint chips, which is believed to be related to the recent extreme swings in temperature. Although lead is a known health hazard, the existence of paint chips on the ground poses little danger to your health if a few common-sense practices are observed. Your goal is to reduce exposure and contain the hazard.

First, <u>do not</u> handle or move the debris. Cleanup efforts are already in progress and a larger state-wide mitigation plan is in development. Second, <u>avoid walking through or disturbing the debris</u>. Crushing the paint chips and tracking them to other locations on the soles of your shoes can increase the size of the contaminated area and increase your likelihood of exposure. Third, <u>when encountering areas of paint release on roadway travel surfaces, limit your time in areas where traffic is crushing paint chips and possibly creating contaminated dust. Finally, take note of the location and the area of impact. Is it on the roadway, sidewalk, in a stream or river, or is it in a residential or school zone? <u>Record the information and inform your supervisor upon your return to your work facility.</u></u>



During the course of your normal duties, if you encounter areas that have been impacted by the sudden release of lead-based paint, following these few simple best-practices will either reduce or eliminate your chance of exposure to lead and help contain the hazardous material.

SUBJECT: Reinstatement of Licensure Renewal Requirements

On February 7, 2023, the Commissioner of the CT Department of Public Health <u>ordered</u> an additional extension for the renewal of licensure requirements. This Order extends the requirement to renew from February 8, 2023 to May 9, 2023 for Certified Water System Operators whose certification renewal was previously suspended due to the COVID-19 Pandemic. No additional extension or modification of the renewal deadline is expected.

Currently there are 445 Certified Water System Operators and Certified Backflow Prevention Device Testers and Cross Connection Survey Inspectors whose certifications are due to expire on May 9, 2023. This represents more than 20% of the certified operator community who, if not renewed, will no longer be certified to perform the required / necessary operational activities of our PWSs. As of today, these certified individuals now have less than 76 days remaining to renew their certification.

This more recent Order extends the expiration date beyond the 3-year renewal cycle for certifications that were **originally due to expire on March 31, 2020**. As a result, these certifications must meet the requirements for **both** renewal cycles by the extended May 9, 2023 expiration date. Separate renewal notices will be issued to these operators.

Note, if an operator files an application without leaving sufficient time for the department to process the application, the operator's certification will expire on May 9, 2023. Any operator with an expired certification will be prohibited from performing water system operations, backflow prevention device testing or cross connection inspections, as specified by Connecticut General Statute 25-32(n).

Section 25-32-14 of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies also makes clear that if a certificate is not renewed by the expiration date, the certificate expires and the operator is no longer certified. Expired certifications may be renewed up to 6 months following the expiration date (i.e. November 9, 2023) through submission of a completed application that meets the renewal requirements. If not renewed within six months of the expiration date, individuals have to meet all initial certification eligibility requirements (i.e. application, passage of examination) to become certified again.

!reating 'forever chemicals' in water

Iew regulation could cost millions in Connecticut

iblic water utilities throughout Connecticut may soon be required to install millions of dollars in new treatment technology to help move "forever chemicals" from the tap water that tens of thousands of people drink every day.

nose upgrades will be necessary to comply with a new federal regulation that seeks to limit people's exposure to the chemicals, known perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances — PFAS for short.

ne newly proposed rule would, for the first time, establish an enforceable limit on some of the most common types of PFAS in public inking water systems — a step that environmental advocates have been demanding for years.

wironmental studies have shown that PFAS contamination is prevalent throughout the United States and the rest of the world.

early every American has some level of the compounds in their bodies. The chemicals have been found in rivers, ponds, soil, aquifers and many drinking water systems throughout the country.

1at includes traces that have been found in some of Connecticut's largest public water systems.

ne chemical properties of PFAS made them useful in many manufacturing processes. The man-made compounds were used for decades produce things like nonstick pans, waterproof clothing, stain-resistant carpets and an industrial fire fighting foam that was used at rports, military bases and local fire stations. PFAS are often referred to as "forever chemicals" because they don't break down easily in e environment, and the compounds are known to build up in people's blood over time.

ne chemicals don't pose an immediate risk for people who ingest limited amounts through drinking water. But public health officials e still concerned about the long-term health implications for communities that frequently consume even small amounts of the nemicals over a lifetime.

oidemiological studies and toxicology research found potential links between the compounds and a number of negative health atcomes, including developmental issues, immunological problems, thyroid disorders and kidney or testicular cancers.

lose human health concerns prompted the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to establish advisory limits for several types of PFAS drinking water systems in 2016.

it those limits were only recommendations. They did not require public water utilities to treat for the chemicals, even if testing found gnificant levels of the compounds in the water.

lat is now expected to change.

'A officials announced on March 14 that the federal agency plans to implement mandatory enforcement levels for six different types of 'AS that have been found in public drinking water systems.

lat regulatory announcement is a big step for most of the country, including Connecticut.

) to this point, only a handful of states, including Maine, Michigan, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New Hampshire and Vermont, enacted forceable limits for the chemicals in their public water systems.

e EPA's newly proposed regulation would be mandatory nationwide, and it will be even stricter than most of the existing state laws. e regulation does not apply to the 322,000 private drinking water wells in Connecticut.

e two most common types of PFAS that will be regulated under the federal rule are chemicals known as PFOA and PFOS. The EPA said it ll require public water systems to add new filtration technology or find different sources of water if those chemicals are found in ncentrations above 4 parts per trillion.

r perspective, 1 part per trillion is comparable to finding a single drop of the chemicals in 20 Olympic-sized swimming pools.

at extremely low limit is being put in place in order to protect people from a lifetime of exposure to the chemicals. But it will mean that any public water utilities that previously thought their water was acceptable will now need to alter their treatment plants to deal with e chemicals.

ristopher Bellona, a civil and environmental engineering professor at the Colorado School of Mines, said the new EPA regulation marks 'generational shift" in water treatment in the United States.

e fact that PFAS contamination is so widespread throughout the country, Bellona said, means that many public water systems will soon required to adapt to the new rules.

s's a very challenging problem, and it just seems to be getting more complicated as time goes on," Bellona said.

nat it means for Connecticut: It's unclear at this point how many public water systems in Connecticut are supplying tap water that nations PFAS levels above 4 parts per trillion.

hat's because the chemical sampling that has been conducted at public water systems in recent years was voluntary.

he Connecticut Department of Public Health, like agencies in most other states, only has an advisory limit in place. That public health dvisory started at 70 parts per trillion in 2016 and was reduced last year to as little as 10 parts per trillion.

ut it remained simply a recommendation.

hat meant the operators of public water systems were not required to regularly report testing results for the chemicals like they do for nercury, arsenic, lead and a host of other regulated contaminants.

tate officials encouraged the public systems to conduct sampling and to voluntarily share the results with the state and their water istomers. But not all of them did that.

here is no mention of PFAS testing results in the most recent water quality reports for the Waterbury Water Department, the Danbury later Department, the New Britain Water Department, the Meriden Water Division, the Bristol Water Department, the Middletown later Department, the Southington Water Department or the Metropolitan District Commission, which supplies water to roughly 30,000 people in Hartford and 11 other surrounding communities.

ut Connecticut isn't immune to the problem.

ome of the state's largest drinking water providers have publicly shared PFAS testing results in recent years, and those results indicate 11 those utilities have pockets of PFAS contamination that will need to be managed once the new federal rule goes into effect.

he Regional Water Authority, which supplies 418,000 people in and around New Haven, found PFAS concentrations just above 4 parts er trillion at some of its wells in Cheshire, which supplies roughly 3% to 5% of the utility's water.

quarion, an investor-owned utility that delivers water to an estimated 695,000 people in Connecticut, reported PFAS concentrations pove 4 parts per trillion in water sources that supply parts of Darien, Simsbury, Danbury, Woodbury, New Fairfield, New Milford, reenwich, Newtown and a number of its other local systems.

onnecticut Water, another investor-owned utility that serves more than 243,000 people in the state, documented similar findings at its *i*stems in Avon, Vernon, Brooklyn, Guilford and several other locations.

nd the Manchester Water Department, which serves more than 51,000 people in that town, recently reported PFAS levels as high as 21 arts per trillion at one of its water intake locations.

More towns joining opioid fight

Harwinton the latest to adopt Narcan leave-behind kits: 'Think of it as keeping them alive for another day'

Since the Department of Public Health added naloxone leave-behind kits to its statewide emergency services protocols last year in an effort to stem the opioid epidemic, many towns and cities have initiated the program.

larwinton is the latest, and maybe the smallest municipality so far, to adopt the program. The Litchfield County town of 5,484 people is tarting its leave-behind program next week.

'I think the stigma has contributed to the mindset of it being a larger city problem when in reality anyone can be impacted by opioid use, egardless of the community you live in," said Darian Graells.

Fraells is the coordinator for Region 10 Community Wellness Coalition, which serves Harwinton and Burlington.

'The need is definitely out there. People want to be educated about this," she said. "You never know when it can happen or where an overdose can occur."

laron Franzi, deputy chief for Harwinton Emergency Medical Services, said since 2020 first responders have seen 22 drug overdoses in larwinton. "This number also includes ... overdoses due to overmedicating," Franzi said.

Many organizations statewide, including Graells', conduct community outreach to teach citizens how to use naloxone, an opioid intagonist whose trade name is Narcan. At these outreaches, naloxone doses are given to participants to carry in case that person incounters someone overdosing.

eave-behind kits are handled differently. EMTs leave kits with people likely to be present during an opioid emergency. "These kits (are) vailable to patients and family members when our crews respond to an overdose," Franzi said.

eave-behind kits contain two doses of naloxone nasal spray, instructions on how to use it, gloves, a CPR mask and contact information or substance use-treatment resources.

tate protocols suggest leave-behind kits be left with a patient who refuses treatment or transport, a family member or friend of a ratient, a person requesting naloxone at an EMS station or at the scene of a call, or someone who used their naloxone on the patient efore the EMTs arrived.

ranzi emphasized that when an overdose is happening, speed is of the essence.

Narcan helps in rapidly reversing the overdose, which in turn will get the patient breathing again. Giving the community access to these ree kits is crucial to the patient's survival and outcome," he said.

ranzi added that a person who has naloxone but doesn't know how to use it can call 911 for instructions.

raells said some people object to naloxone use because of the stigma surrounding substance use.

Some people will say we are just enabling them to stay alive and to continue their use. But from a public health perspective, think of it as eeping them alive for another day to make the choice to go get treatment," she said.

ccording to the state Poison Control Center, 18 other municipalities have reported that they have adopted naloxone leave-behind rograms.

Iunicipalities reporting their programs to Poison Control are Bristol, Canton, Cheshire, East Hartford, Enfield, Hartford, Meriden, Iiddletown, New Britain, New London, Norwich, Old Lyme, Plymouth, Vernon, Waterbury, Watertown, Winchester and Wolcott.

he actual number of participating towns and cities is higher than 18, according to the state Department of Public Health, because unicipalities are not required to report their program to Poison Control.

We're in the process of automating the reporting system, and soon it will be a lot easier to figure out who's handing out kits," said DPH pokesman Chris Boyle. He estimated this automation update will be finished within six months.

ommunity Wellness Coalition spearheaded the leave-behind program in Harwinton, working with the Town of Harwinton, Harwinton mbulance Association, McCall Behavioral Health Network and Greenwoods Counseling and Referral Services.

Decomposing rodents' among issues flagged in restaurants

One eatery in Hartford had live roaches in fried chicken

estaurant inspections in Hartford show one eatery had live roaches in fried chicken and another had a mouse problem so extreme that he rodents were active in the food prep area, nesting in the ceiling, while there were "decomposing rodents in the basement."

ecords from May 2022 to February 2023 show at least seven restaurants failed inspections, with violations that included not only vermin ut conditions such as improper temperatures for both hot and cold foods, unclean equipment, improper food handling, unsafe food torage and myriad others.

he number of restaurants that failed in Hartford during that 10-month period are far fewer than have averaged for the same period in maller cities and towns where records were examined by the Courant, and that may be because of a shortage of inspectors in the city, a ituation officials are working to address.

here are 935 licensed facilities requiring inspection in the city, including churches, retail restaurants, mini marts and gas stations. Of hose, there are 359 Class 4 facilities, which restaurants fall under, records show.

lartford Health director Liany E. Arroyo said they are down inspectors, as has been reported in Hartford, and in an effort to fill the need ave been working with human resources and the union

rroyo said they are budgeted for eight inspectors, including one team lead, and they currently have three fully certified food inspectors, aree trainees and two openings.

he said with fewer inspectors "it's been more of a challenge" to go out and do inspections to "assure food safety." But she couldn't draw direct link between the inspector shortage and the low number of failures compared to other municipalities.

rroyo said they have kept up with responding to complaints about restaurants and keeping tabs at potentially high-risk venues such as nose that serve raw fish.

rroyo also said the surprise inspections represent "one point in time," and a failed inspection doesn't mean people shouldn't eat there. n inspection could be off because people are having bad day, have new employees or other situations that can develop.

1 the cases where there is vermin found, or some other complicated problem, restaurants will often voluntarily close for a day or so to priect the problem, often working with the city.

Everyone is human, everyone can make an error," Arroyo said, noting people aren't "always perfect" in their own home kitchens.

large purpose of the inspections is to "educate" restaurant owners, and the "overwhelming" number of restaurants want to learn and poperate, Arroyo said.

he Health Department team always goes into the inspections with a "collaborative" approach, she said.

We do view ourselves as a partnership," Arroyo said. She said restaurants are important, as they bring people into the city and feed eople.

he Courant obtained the public records through a Freedom of Information Act request. The records were delivered electronically without large.

he inspections are scored on a scale of 100 points and establishments that receive 80 and above pass, unless they receive even one fourpint violation.

four-point violation is an automatic fail because those violations can pose the highest risk for foodborne illness. In other words, a score f 96 could be a fail if those four points represent one of the four-point violations such as improper temperatures for potentially azardous food or the lack of accessibility to sinks.

eateries fail inspection, they are typically reinspected in two weeks.

artford restaurants that failed inspection and in some cases reinspection include:

1 ammy Yummy Chinese, 450 Franklin Ave. was inspected in December 2022 and scored a 64 with two four-point violations.

ne restaurant had numerous violations checked off on the form and many handwritten notes by the inspector, including that there were raches observed in fried chicken on top of the prep line.

ne chicken was discarded on the spot, the report states.

ne report states there were "live roaches and mice droppings" under the kitchen prep station.

ne day after the inspection, the inspector dropped by with educational materials related to some of the violations, records indicate.

ney also reviewed an action plan with a pest control outfit "to improve the strategy and approach to control the established roach opulation," the report states.

n addition, the inspector wrote: "Food worker offered envelope filled with cash to sanitarian, stating, "Happy New Year." — envelope eturned with detailed explanation provided."

'ummy Yummy Chinese also failed a reinspection the following month with a 69 and three four-point violations.

n addition to the roaches and mice, other violations included: temperatures for potentially hazardous foods and meats; unclean cutting oard and reach-in unit; uncovered foods in walk-in cooler; no written documentation of a training program; raw beef stored above fried hicken in the walk-in cooler; rusty, greasy shelves in the walk-in cooler; food container with uncovered plantains stored on the floor; ispensing utensil stored in stagnant water; not sanitizing food-contact surfaces.

he report also states: "A lot of raw animal products present," and that a worker did not wash hands after handling raw foods.

. person answering the phone at the restaurant and identified himself as the owner said the roach problem has been addressed and no onger exists

Voodland Pizza, 150 Woodland St. was inspected in November 2022 and received a 70, including a four-point violation for hand-washing acility issues.

he restaurant was reinspected in January 2023 and failed with a 78 and two four-point violations. The inspector's notes focus heavily on he presence of mice and states fixes are "due immediately."

he written report states that there continues to be "a major mouse problem.".

he report states: "Excessive mouse activity in the food prep area dead decaying ... In basement — decomposing rodents."

at the kitchen there were mouse droppings in the new service preparea and mice "nesting in the ceiling area."

he notes also state there was "uncovered food containers in walk in cooler; food stored on floor in the area of back door and kitchen; anitizing solution not available; wet clothes lying around the kitchen; an unclean can opener; no thermometer in walk-in cooler; utdoor opening — not protected from vermin and pests, and "whole facility needs general maintenance and cleaning."

man who answered the restaurant's telephone said pest control comes every month and there are no more mice.

Jan's Chinese Kitchen, 162 Washington St. failed an inspection in August 2022 with a 75.

he inspector's notes state there were several 5-gallon buckets of chicken stored on the floor of the walk in cooler; a deteriorated walk in coler gasket; buckets of chicken, pork and beef uncovered in the walk-in cooler; rusty shelves in the walk in cooler; unlabeled ranulated food in storage area; "scoop used for serving soy sauce stored in stagnant room temperature water next to stove."

he report notes also state: "Presence of insect in storage room with rice and flour."

1 addition, the report states: "Unclean tong used for raw pork then used to removed fried fish from deep fryer."

he report also states a "high volume of raw meat being processed by three food workers and no handwashing observed."

o reinspection report was available.

o one could be reached for comment at the restaurant.

erraza Latina, 438 Franklin Ave. failed inspection in May 2022 with a score of 69, including two four-point violations.

he inspector's notes indicate a dirty floor; the kitchen not vented properly; food not covered properly; food containers on the floor; a irty refrigerator; food containers not properly labeled.

he restaurant was reinspected in June and passed.

he owner could not be reached for comment.

inder Pizza and Ranch House, 2543 Main St. failed inspection in January 2023 with a 77, including two four-point violations.

ccording to the inspector's notes: newspaper was being used to cover food in the walk-in; a pizza oven was dirty; dented cans were cored in the back for use; food was being stored on transport crates and on the floor in the walk-in; hand-wash stations were "not eally" accessible; a can opener had "dirty teeth"; shelves were dirty.

uring the inspection a container with a small amount of sugar was thrown out "due to possible pests in the sugar," the report states. In February reinspection the restaurant passed with a score of 91.

ne inspector's notes include: storing utensils in stagnant water; uncovered food in the walk in cooler; are-hand contact of employees with ready to NAAN coming out of the oven; not washing hands after handing raw animal origin product. nere was no reinspection report available.
